Fulbright Fellowships- Great Opportunity

A B-W campus workshop for students interested in Fulbright Fellowships for Study/Teaching Abroad will be held at 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, March 31, 2010 in 110 Malicky Center.

Are you a current sophomore or junior with an interest in studying, researching or pursuing a project in the creative or performing arts in a foreign country after graduation? Or are you interested in teaching English abroad? Dr. Judy Krutky, Campus Fulbright Program Advisor, will discuss the requirements for applicants and the application process with interested students at the campus workshop.

.Applications for fellowships for study for the academic year

2011-12 will be accepted in fall 2010 from well-qualified seniors in most fields of study. Factors that increase a student's likelihood of winning a Fulbright grant are good grades (at least a 3.00 GPA), ability to communicate in the language of the country the student chooses for an application (the English-speaking countries are the most competitive), and a well-founded reason to go abroad for study or research. Fulbright will not fund activities which could be carried out just as well in the U.S. Particularly attractive are applications to research some phenomenon that only occurs in the country chosen or to study with a scholar/artist who lives there. Fulbright Fellowships will provide round-trip international transportation,

tuition (when applicable), health and accident insurance, and maintenance for one academic year in a foreign country.

There are also additional opportunities for graduating seniors to teach English abroad for the 2011-12 academic year. Several governments use the Fulbright application process to select English instructors to teach in their countries. This possibility will also be discussed at the meeting. (Students do not need to be EDU majors.)

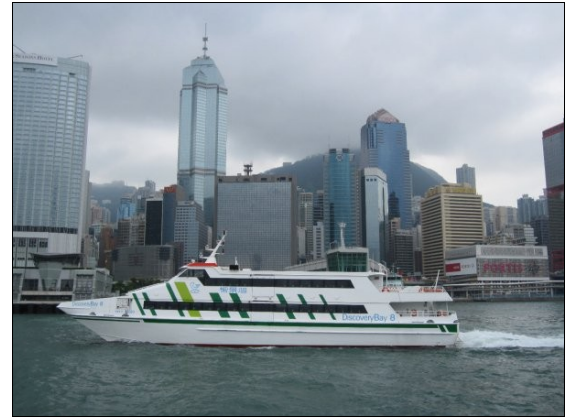


Greetings from Hong Kong!

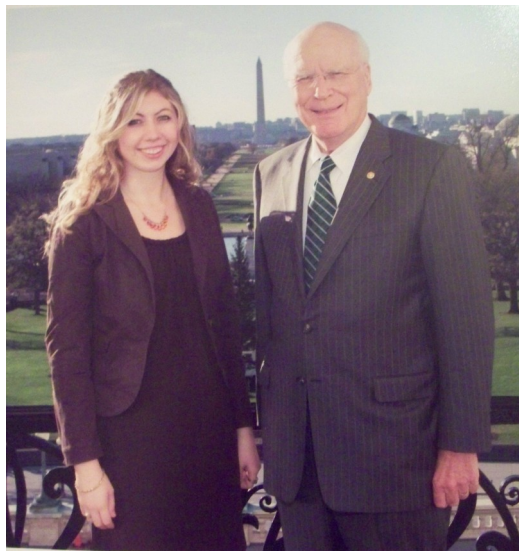
Everyday here is so interesting interacting with the local students, Professors and other international students. This is such a wonderful opportunity that I wish more students would experience."

Hearing from an Alum: Kristin Tarajack

My educational background: I received my Bachelor of Arts degree from B-W in 2006; I majored in political science and minored in psychology and international studies. Upon graduating, I attended Cleveland State University and received my Master of Public Administration degree with a concentration in Economic Development from CSU's Maxine Goodman Levin College of Urban Affairs.

My B-W career path: I started attending B-W in 2002 after graduating from Poland Seminary High School in Youngstown, Ohio. I initially entered as a psych major and also had an interest in pre-law but I really wasn't sure what direction my studies were going to take me in terms of a career. After taking an introductory political science course and becoming more aware of the career opportunities available to political science majors ranging from work in the public, private and nonprofit sectors, I switched my major to political science. As I pursued my poli sci major I became especially interested in the courses dealing with international topics and chose to also complete an international studies minor. During my time at B-W, I had numerous opportunities to become involved working in the poli sci office as a tutor for Prof. Burke's introductory poli sci course, as a research assistant and later a course assistant for Dr. Mattern, and as a general office assistant.

What I do: CPAC is a nonprofit arts and culture service agency dedicated to helping Greater Cleveland succeed by working to preserve and advance its arts and culture sector. CPAC demonstrates to policy makers, funders and the general public the contributions the arts and culture sector makes to our economy, education and quality of life. CPAC helps the arts and culture sector prosper by fostering best practices in business development, sound cultural public policy and in-depth research. As the research manager, I am primarily responsible for developing, implementing and evaluating CPAC's research programs and services. I draft research reports, analyze data and report on the findings both to local and national audiences. However, since we are a small nonprofit, I have had the opportunity to also help implement many of CPAC's programs including an artist business skills training workshop (Artist as an Entrepreneur Institute), a national conference on artist-based community development (From Rust Belt to Artist Belt II), a collaborative marketing project among arts organizations (Collaborative Marketing Database) and an individual artist grant program (Creative Workforce Fellowship).

How my major has helped professionally: My political science major: expanded my world view; exposed me to a very diverse group of individuals in terms of peers and faculty; gave me skills in public speaking, debate and critical writing, especially the ability to see and argue for both sides of an issue; opened the door for my future studies; and more than adequately prepared me for the rigors of graduate study. B-W's liberal arts emphasis in general has been a major source of professional strength as I am able to draw on knowledge from a wide array of fields and their various research models when developing reports and advocacy pieces.

Classes I found extremely useful: In poli sci dept-introduction to political theory, introduction to political analysis, public interest research, civil liberties in the united states, American national government; Outside of dept- courses in: economics (microeconomics, elements of statistics), intl studies (intro to intl studies), communication (public speaking, group communication and leadership), and honors (problem solving).

General comments: I know this is stressed all the time, but I cannot express how much getting involved on campus and especially in the political science dept helped me grow professionally. Don't be afraid to approach any professor to simply ask a question after class, to ask them about opportunities to become involved in the dept, or to carry out an independent study project.

**Do you like being actively involved in exciting discussions in which you are also learning about the world?
Then, Model U.N. may be for you!**

What is Model U.N.? Model United Nations is a series of simulations run as conferences where participating teams of students from different universities learn about the inner workings of various IGOs such as the United Nations. Students gather in groups of 15 to over 1000 to represent different member states' foreign policies and tackle various current issues through negotiation and debate.

What is the Value of Being a Member of B-W's Model UN Team? Model UN offers a unique *hands-on* opportunity to learn about the processes of international diplomacy and the way problems are solved on a global level. Learning to function as part of a team is also an excellent pre-professional experience for students who work mostly on papers and tests in college but need to function as team members in a work force. The communication, negotiation, and public speaking aspects of Model UN additionally make it very relevant for students of all majors. Indeed, Model UN is not a program limited to only International Studies or Political Science students. The broad nature of the skills learned cut across nearly all majors and the experience is valuable for any major if the student has an interest in the functions of international negotiation and poli-

cymaking. Finally, Model UN also offers students the opportunity to meet and interact with others with similar interests from across the globe, as many of the conferences are international in nature and attract students from dozens of countries each year.

Course Requirements for Participating in B-W Model UN? To participate in B-W's Model UN team, students must take the prerequisite course POL 215 (a two credit course offered during minimester A in fall 2010) one time. Students must then take POL 216 (a 1 or 2 credit course offered during minimester B in fall 2010 and spring 2010) if they wish to participate in any conferences that semester (i.e. students who desire to participate in the fall conference would take POL 216 in the fall along with POL 215; students who desire to participate in the spring 2011 conferences would take POL 215 in the fall and POL 216 in the spring. Participation in all conferences is a possibility if students take POL 216 throughout the year).
