Head Golf Coach Chris Kibler



Chris Kibler returned to his alma mater, Baldwin-Wallace College as the Head Men's Golf coach after spending five years at NCAA Division II Gannon (Pa.) University.

A 1994 graduate of the College who earned his Master's degree in Sports Administration at Kent State University in 1998, Kibler helped Gannon to a 105-39 record during his five years, including four straight NCAA Division II Tournament appearances with the men's basketball team.

Kibler served as an assistant basketball coach at Centenary College in Hackettstown, New Jersey during the 1995-96 season and then returned to Ohio to begin work on his masters degree at Kent State. From 1996-1998,

Kibler served as an assistant coach at B-W and helped the Yellow Jackets win an OAC Tournament title and earn a spot to host a first round NCAA Division III Tournament contest.

While a student at B-W, Kibler majored in business administration, sport management and pre-law. He also worked in the sports information office. At B-W Kibler also serves as an assistant basketball coach for Head Coach Steve Bankson. He is responsible for assisting Bankson with all aspects of game and practice situations as well as scouting and recruiting.

"I enjoyed my first season as the men's golf coach," said Kibler. "This fall, we have a strong nucleus of our team coming back and have a few recruits who will come in and compete very hard to challenge an already talented roster."

"The 2004-2005 B-W Golf season should prove to be one of B-W's finest. We'll enter this year with a lot of expectations, mostly self-imposed expecta-

tions," said Kibler. "Last year we finished second in the OAC, yet we were very inconsistent throughout the year. Therefore, a point of emphasis will be to improve our consistency, and finish better in every tournament than last year. Our main goal will be to win the OAC. I look forward to that challenge this year." said Kibler

"Chris is a young man with great energy and enthusiasm," said Bankson. "He has also been an active recruiter and scout of the opposition. We feel that he has been a solid addition in our basketball program and a great leader as our head men's golf coach."

"We will achieve everything in a first class manner," said Kibler. "It is a great privilege to represent Baldwin-Wallace College in any sport, and as golfers we will certainly uphold the gentlemen's code of conduct and behavior."

Kibler is a native of New Concord, Ohio and a graduate of John Glenn High School.

Yellow Jacket Men's Golf Team Has Productive Fall Season; Yellow Jackets Now Begin Spring Schedule

BEREA, OHIO -- The Baldwin-Wallace College men's golf team had a productive fall season and now moves forward to the spring as the Yellow Jackets will look to contend for the 2004-2005 Ohio Athletic Conference Championship.

B-W competed in four tournaments during the fall season with a team-best performance of fourth place out of 11 schools at the Wittenberg University Invitational in September.

All-OAC and number one golfer, junior Bobby Santerre (Cincinnati/LaSalle) led the team with a 76.88 stroke average during the fall. He had a best round of 74 which he shot at the Denison University Fall Invitational. Senior Chuck Scarbrough (Warren/Howland) was a close second with a 77.63 stroke average. Junior Steve Porter (Massillon/Perry) finished third at 78.50, junior team captain Gary Petit (Marietta) was

fourth with an 80.25 stroke average and freshman Nate Federonick (Mogadore/Field) rounded out the top five averaging 81.17 strokes per round.

After almost a five month layoff, the Yellow Jackets will now look to make up more ground in the conference as B-W sets its sights on the OAC Championship.

The Spring season officially began with the annual spring trip south. This season, B-W traveled to Phoenix, Arizona during spring break in preparation for the upcoming season. While there, the Yellow Jackets took on Central (Iowa) College in dual match at the Palm Valley Golf Course in Goodyear, Ariz.

Despite losing the match, 297-317, B-W still posted a strong showing. Santerre started out the second half of the season the same way he ended the first, firing a team-low 74 which placed

him third overall individually. Junior Joseph Tornabene (Canton/Jackson) shot a 78 which tied him for tenth place individually with teammate and freshman Mike Jenior (Rootstown) who also finished with a 78. Scarbrough carded an 80 for 13th place while Petit and senior Aaron Cuddy (Ashtabula/St. John & Paul) each shot an 81.

Last spring, B-W finished in second place in the 2003-2004 OAC Championships and the Yellow Jacket men's golf team is well on its way to finishing as the top team in the conference.

The 2004-2005 men's golf team has the potential to exceed many expectations and should be a force to reckon with this spring. The Yellow Jackets will continue the spring season March 25-26 at the Muskingum College Invitational.



The Ohio Athletic Conference; the Third Oldest Conference in the Nation



Entering its 102nd year, the Ohio Athletic Conference will look to continue its prominence during the 2004-05 year. In 2003-2004, the OAC was once again represented well at the national level, both academically and athletically.

During the 2003-04 season the OAC advanced 11 teams to the NCAA Division III "Sweet 16", including Wilmington College winning the National Title in women's basketball. Mount Union College finished runner-up in football and the John Carroll University men's basketball squad finished third. Three teams finished in the "Elite Eight" at the NCAA's: Ohio Northern University in volleyball, Muskingum College in softball and Wilmington in indoor track and field; and five teams ended their seasons in the "Sweet 16": Baldwin-Wallace College in football, Wilmington in women's soccer, JCU in men's soccer and wrestling and Otterbein College in men's golf. Individually, Mount Union's Eddis Singleton and Wilmington's Emily Herring both became national champions in their respective events, the 50-yard freestyle in swimming and the high jump in track and field.

Individually, the Conference was represented by 56 All-Americans, 32 men and 24 women, and 13 Academic All-Americans to go along with a bevy of regional and national honors for our student-athletes and coaches. The Conference also had an athlete earn CoSIDA Academic All-America Team Member-of-the-Year honors in her respective sport.

The OAC, the third oldest conference in college athletics, is predated only by the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (1888) and the Big Ten (1895). The Conference is older than the World Series and even the NCAA itself and has survived two world wars, the Great Depression, the Korean War and the Vietnam Conflict. From a modest beginning of six charter members in 1902, the OAC grew to as many as 24 members in the mid-1920s.

Through the years a total of 30 colleges and universities at one time or another have been members of the OAC. Currently the Conference consists of 10 members, including Baldwin-Wallace College, Capital University, Heidelberg College, John Carroll University, Marietta College, Mount Union College,

Muskingum College, Ohio Northern University, Otterbein College and Wilmington College. Wilmington became the 31st OAC member school, on July 1, 2000.

In the OAC's first year of existence, 1902, the first Conference champion was crowned. Case Tech won the football title with a 5-0-0 record. Outdoor track was added a year later and a third sport, cross country, became a Conference sport in 1914. More sports were steadily added to the OAC's repertoire throughout the years, culminating in the addition of women's sports in 1984. The Conference currently sponsors championships in 21 sports, 11 men's and 10 women's.

The enrollments at the 10 OAC institutions range from 1,200 to 4,500. All of the schools were founded in the 19th century and have long and outstanding academic reputations. While maintaining these high academic standards, Ohio Athletic Conference athletic teams and athletes have consistently enjoyed a great deal of success on a regional and national level. The athletic competition is viewed not as an end in itself, but as an extension of the educational programs.

The Men's Golf Team Posted a Second Place Finish at the 2003-2004 OAC Men's Golf Championships



BEREA, OHIO -- The Baldwin-Wallace College men's golf team finished in second of nine teams at the Ohio Athletic Conference Tournament hosted by Otterbein College at Rattlesnake Ridge in Sunbury. Sophomore Bobby Santerre (Cincinnati/LaSalle) shot a two-day total 155 (82-73) and finished in the top-ten to earn All-OAC honors.

The Yellow Jackets carded a first-day, 18-hole team total of 325 strokes and followed that effort with a 323-stroke total on the second day to finish behind Otterbein College who shot a two-day total 610.

Individually, B-W was led by Santerre who finished fifth individually with the 155 total. He was followed by

sophomore Steve Porter (Massillon/Perry) at 164, senior Luke Sondej (Columbus/Upper Arlington) with a 167, sophomore Gary Petit (Marietta) at 168 and sophomore Joe Tornabene (Canton/Jackson) carded a 168-stroke total.

The Yellow Jackets end a very successful spring season finishing in the top-ten in five out of the six tournaments played this season including finishing first at the John Carroll Tournament. B-W will lose just one player this year and will return a solid core of players next year.

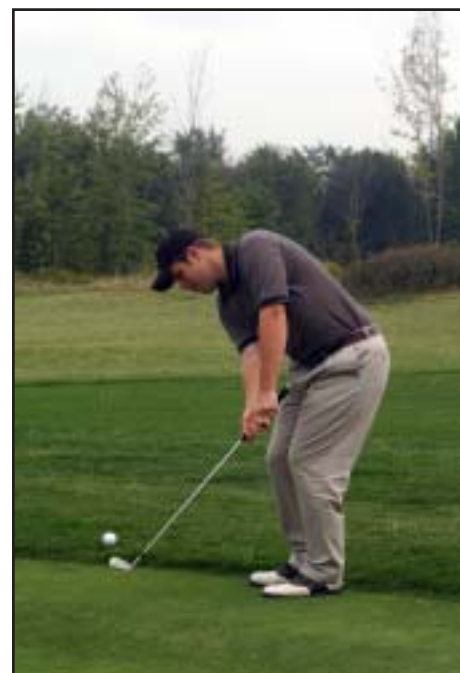

The Baldwin-Wallace College spring sports season is already underway and the Yellow Jackets had success on their spring trips.

BEREA, OHIO — The Baldwin-Wallace College spring sports season is already underway and the Yellow Jackets had success on their spring trips.

The Yellow Jacket spring sport teams returned to Berea (March 13) with a combined 19-11 record (.633) and the men's track team won a meet title and the women were second of 10 colleges and universities.

Men's Tennis

The men's tennis team had a perfect 6-0 record on their trip to Hilton Head, South Carolina. The six wins give it an 11-0 overall mark this season and ran its Ohio Athletic Conference-record consecutive dual match winning streak to 33. The defending OAC champions were led by freshman second singles player James Daly (Akron/ Firestone) and senior number three player Ward Crane (Hudson/ Western Reserve Academy) as each had a 6-0 mark. In addition, 2004 OAC Player of the Year, senior first singles player Mike Wagner (Avon Lake) had a 5-1 slate. Entering northern play, Wagner and Daly are tied for wins with 16 each and each

player is 16-2 overall. Crane is third at 12-2 overall at No.3.

In doubles play, Daly and senior Adam Slabodnick (Ashland/ Senior) were 6-0 as the No.2 duo and are now 13-1 overall this season. Wagner and Crane were 5-1 in Hilton Head at No.1 and the tandem of sophomore Ryan McCartney (Lorain/ Admiral King) and Dan Mitoff (Lorain/ Admiral King) were 3-0 at No.3. Wagner and Crane are now 12-2 at No.1 in 2004-2005.

The men open northern play this Thursday, March 17 against Walsh University. Due to current weather conditions, stay tuned to the web site for further details.

Women's Tennis

The women's tennis team had a 5-2 slate in Hilton Head and are now 6-2 overall entering northern play this Friday and Saturday, March 18-19 against Walsh on Friday and Malone College on Saturday. Again, stay tuned to the web site for further updates.

Individually, sophomore No.1 singles and doubles player Andrea Issac

(New Philadelphia) was a perfect 6-0 in singles and combined with freshman Meggie Glassburn (Canton/ Jackson) for a 7-0 slate in doubles. Also in singles, junior Kristen Thomson (Strongsville) was 4-1 in singles action and junior Ashley Sanders (North Canton/ Louisville St. Thomas Aquinas) was 5-2. Also in doubles action, the number two tandem of Thomson and Sanders were 5-2 and the No.3 duo of freshman Tiffany Allison (Chagrin Falls/ Kenston) and freshman Krista Marshall (Medina/ Senior) were 6-1. To date, Issac tops all singles players at 10-3 overall and Sanders is 8-3. In doubles play, Issac and Glassburn lead the way at 9-4 overall.

Men's and Women's Outdoor Track and Field

In winning a meet title at the Disney Relays, the Yellow Jacket men had five individual event champions and one second place finisher. Headlining the

winner was freshman Jim Roy (West Simsbury, Conn./ Simsbury) who qualified provisionally for the NCAA Division III National Championship Meet with a winning throw of 188-feet and seven inches. The others winners were senior Eric Schmuhl (Medina/ Senior) with a time of 55.20 seconds in the 400 intermediate hurdles, sophomore Steve Johnson (Canton/ Central Catholic) in the pole vault with a vault of 13' 11.75", junior Josh Svenson (Wadsworth) in the discus with a throw of 134' 9" and sophomore Adam Eltrich (Lorain/ Amherst/ Steele) in the hammer throw with a toss of 131' 3". Also, freshman Ian Michalik (Sandusky/ Perkins) was second in the 5000 meter run in 15:45.44.

The women's second place showing was led by senior Lisa Bartkiewicz's (Berea) second place finish in the 5000 meter run in 18:23.79. In addition, freshman Molly Clauss (West Falls, N.Y./ East Aurora) was third in the 3000 meter steeplechase in 12:20.56, freshman Megan Cathcart (Parma/ Senior) was third in the high jump at 5'3" and junior Angela Gruss (Tiffin/ Calvert) was third in the pole vault with a vault of 10'1.5".

The track teams are idle this week and get back to action on Saturday, March 26 when they compete at the annual Muskingum College Invitational in New Concord.

Baseball

The Yellow Jacket baseball team compiled a 5-3 record down south and came north with a two-game winning streak and hopes of somehow playing at Urbana University this Saturday and Sunday (March 19-20).

At the Gene Cusic Classic in Ft. Myers, Florida, Head Coach Bob Fisher winning his 600th career game highlighted an impressive trip. Fisher's Yellow Jackets hit the ball at a .358 clip and compiled an impressive 3.57 earned run average.

On the trip, junior RF Dan Melito

(Massillon/ Washington), who missed the final five games of the trip with an injury, led all hitters with a .615 batting average with eight base hits in 13 at-bats, including a team-high tying three doubles and five runs batted-in. Junior leftfielder Mike Farrell (Wickliffe) was second at .478 (11-of-23) with nine runs scored, three doubles, four homers and a team-high 14 RBI. Also, senior Jay Watson (New Philadelphia) hit .429; junior second baseman Kevin Brown (Cuyahoga Falls) hit .417 with a team-high 10 runs scored and had a .588 on-base average; sophomore third baseman Nick Quarando (Amherst/ Marion Steele) batted .409 with a double, three homers and nine RBI; and freshman outfielder Shaun Slater (Wooster/ Norwayne) hit .400 with a double, two homers and nine RBI. Also batting above .300 were junior centerfielder Matt Green (Elyria/ Senior) at .360 and senior third baseman/ pitcher Mike Turchan (Mayfield Heights) at .310 with two homers and eight RBI. Offensively, B-W scored 76 runs in eight games, hit .358 as a team and outscored the opposition, 76-43.

On the mound, senior lefthander Aaron Krieger (Bellefontaine) and senior righthander Nick Slater (Wooster/ Norwayne) each had a victory and a team-leading 0.00 earned run average. Krieger tossed nine innings, allowing seven hits and gave up four unearned runs. Slater pitched six and two-thirds innings and allowed five hits and zero runs. In addition, senior Bob Glavan (Mentor) was 1-1 with a 3.60 ERA, Kynkor was 1-0 with a 4.91 ERA and sophomore Jim Wochele (Richmond Heights) was 1-0 with a 5.07 ERA.

Softball

The softball team had a 4-5 record at the annual Rebel Spring Games in Kissimmee, Florida and ended its trip with a three-game winning streak. It is supposed to open northern play this Saturday by hosting Kenyon College.

On the trip, B-W got some solid

hitting and consistent pitching from seniors K.C. Young (Olmsted Falls) and Jeanette Brezina (Parma/ Valley Forge). Although Young had a 2-3 record, she compiled an impressive 2.30 ERA with 28 strikeouts in 31 and one-third innings pitched. She had five complete games, including a one-hitter in 10-0 win on the final game of the trip. Young also had a strong .379 batting average with a team-leading 11 runs scored, two triples and four RBI. Brezina was 2-2 on the mound with a 2.74 ERA, four complete games and 11 strikeouts in 23 innings of work. At the plate, Brezina batted .292 with a double and three RBI.

Senior first baseman Beth Rubosky (Roaming Shores/ Grand Valley) led the team with a .474 batting average, including four doubles, one homer and six RBI. In addition, senior outfielder Jackie White (Cleveland/ Parma Hts. Holy Name) hit .333 and senior two-time Division III All-American catcher Nicole Loudin (Sheffield Lake/ Elyria Catholic) hit .320 with her 22nd and 23rd career homers and four RBI.

Men's Golf

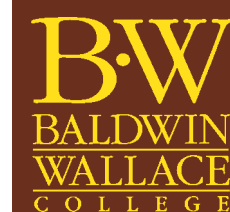
The final B-W team to go on a spring trip was the men's golf team as they travelled to Arizona to play and compete against Central College of Iowa. Despite a 317-297 loss to Central, junior All-OAC player Bobby Santerre (Cincinnati / LaSalle) led the Yellow Jackets with a 74 on the par-72, 7,108-yard Palm Valley Golf Course layout. He was third individually. Also, junior Joe Tornabene (Canton/ Jackson) and freshman Mike Jenior (Rootstown) each finished in the Top-10 and each carded a 78. The linksters are now off until March 25-26 when they travel to the Muskingum College Invitational Tournament.

The Baldwin-Wallace College student is afforded the opportunity to learn, exercise, practice and play in some of the finest facilities in small college athletics. In addition, as a student at B-W, each has an opportunity to use a group of facilities that are unparalleled in Division III athletics.

The Recreation Center with the Ursprung Gymnasium, Harrison Dillard Track and Natatorium, The George Finnie Stadium, the B-W Baseball Field, the "Pop" Collins Tennis Complex and other outdoor recreation and athletic areas at Baldwin-Wallace make the Yellow Jackets physical plant second to none among small colleges.

The Baldwin-Wallace College Recreation Center, dedicated on October 18, 1986, is a facility that benefits all B-W students, faculty, staff and alumni and is considered one of the top recreation facilities in the country.

The 150,000 square foot Rec Center serves as home for the health and physical education departments, all winter intercollegiate and intramural sports, as well as playing host for a number of amateur sporting events.

The Rec Center, which includes the Rudolph S. Ursprung Gymnasium, serves as the home of Yellow Jackets basketball, volleyball and wrestling teams. Ursprung Gymnasium, which has housed B-W basketball since 1949,

received a complete renovation in 1986. In addition to B-W playing in the Ursprung Gym, the Ohio High School Athletic Association has long used the B-W facility for its sectional and district tournaments for boys.

The fieldhouse consists of a 200-

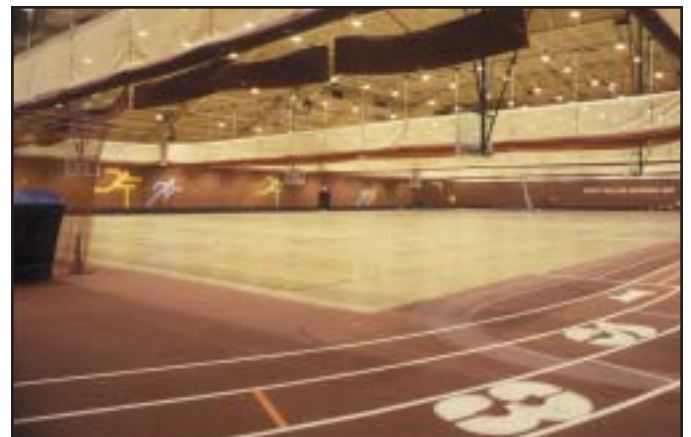

with a one-meter diving board. The movable pool bottom has adaptive physical therapy applications and can be used by the disabled.

As part of the renovation of Ursprung, chairback seating and a new media center were constructed while training and physical therapy, laundry and eight locker rooms were added. Other features include a room for news media as well as exhibit and storage areas for the B-W Athletic Archives. The Archives give students, alumni, parents, friends and visitors to Baldwin-Wallace a glimpse of the rich tradition and heritage of Yellow Jacket teams and athletic greats.

The Finnie Stadium (pictured above) is one of the nations best small college stadiums for football and track and field. The Yellow Jacket men's and women's soccer teams also play at Finnie.

B-W has already hosted three NCAA Division III national championship track meets, numerous NCAA and Ohio High School Athletic Association football playoff games as well as being the home field to both Berea High School and Middleburg Heights Midpark High School. The Ohio Sports Festival/Ohio State Games also uses Finnie as both a regional and state championship site.

The B-W Baseball Field is located

on the campus within walking distance of the student dormitories. The facility has a manicured playing surface and seating for approximately 200 fans. The B-W Baseball Field has been the host site for four OAC Baseball Tournaments and is home to the nationally-ranked Yellow Jacket baseball squad.

The "Pop" Collins Tennis complex

is named in honor of former B-W tennis coach and teacher Arthur Worth Collins, the father of nationally renowned sports-writer and television tennis analyst Arthur "Bud" Collins '51. The facility is on campus and includes six courts which are lighted for night play.

In addition, the Yellow Jacket softball team plays at the Cuyahoga County Fairgrounds Field. Last spring was the first season for the Yellow Jackets at their new field.

Does such a strong group of facilities benefit the Yellow Jacket women's basketball program? Definitely! Practice time is available in the Ursprung Gym or the fieldhouse. That means the men and women can practice at the same time without conflict. Players have a wide variety of options for pre-season and post season weight and conditioning programs.

"The entire Rec Center is a plus to our program," says head coach Cheri Harrer. "The playing, practice and dress facilities are among the finest in Division III. Having a number of courts in the fieldhouse gives us the opportunity to work with a greater number of players in our varsity and junior varsity programs.

"It is one of the finest training centers of any small college in the nation," says Harrer. "We feel the Rec Center has answered the needs of the B-W community."

The Baldwin-Wallace College men's golf student-athlete is one of the best publicized in all of small college and NCAA Division III athletics. Several factors help this to happen.

Its location, its national and conference affiliation and philosophy of athletics, its administration and coaches and its support of the student-athlete all play large roles in telling others about B-W and the successes of its student-athletes.

Baldwin-Wallace College is a small, private, liberal arts college located 12 miles southwest of Cleveland, Ohio. While being in the small and progressive local community of Berea, B-W student-athletes benefit from being close to a major urban area such as Greater Cleveland/Akron. B-W athletics receive support both in Cleveland and Akron and in the Berea community itself.

Being a member of the prestigious Ohio Athletic Conference and playing NCAA Division III athletics also is an advantage. Coaches who are teachers first forge a solid commitment to the Division III philosophy of the student-athlete. Baldwin-Wallace also is proud of its athletic heritage and the fact that it has produced 54 College Division Academic All-Americans since 1972. A year ago, B-W had two Academic All-Americans: football student-athlete Joe Harbour (Upper Sandusky, Ohio) and softball student-athlete Nicole Loudin (Sheffield Lake, Ohio).

"We feel that athletics participation is a part of the educational experience of our student-athletes, not apart from it," said Baldwin-Wallace College President Mark H. Collier.

"We are extremely proud of the success of our athletics programs and our student-athletes."

In 2003, Matt Kish, a football student-athlete attained the highest grade point average in the senior class and was awarded the Milton T. Baldwin Prize at graduation.

Support in terms of facilities, equipment and transportation and in staff provides the Baldwin-Wallace student-athlete with a luxury not enjoyed at many other schools.

One part of that support is in the area of sports information. A diligent staff of B-W sport information student assistants and sport management majors work with the director to publicize B-W and its coaches and student-athletes in 20 NCAA Division III sports.

The students learn first-hand about publicizing a program by updating the internet website, writing hometown press releases and doing feature stories, doing game and cumulative statistics as well as statistical analysis, game and special event programs, recruiting brochures and media guides, contacting local, state and national media sources prior to and after each game and promoting and administering special events during athletic contests.

Each Yellow Jacket Men's golf student-athlete receives a preseason, mid-season and postseason hometown press release which is sent to the individual student-athlete hometown newspaper. When the student-athletes fill out a preseason questionnaire, each is asked to list his or her hometown newspaper.

After each men's golf match, the internet website is updated, a FAX is sent to B-W's base of local, state and national media that regularly cover or have requested B-W coverage. In addition, hometown facsimile messages about individual performances are also sent either the night of the contest or the next day.

The day following an athletic event, statistics are updated and made available to all requesting the information.

Campus radio station WBWC, 88.3 FM, broadcasts all home and away football and basketball games as well as covering all other Yellow Jacket sporting events, press conferences or announcements on a selected basis. *All Yellow Jacket men's and women's basketball games are also broadcast over the internet website at www.bw.edu/athletics.* A number of former B-W student broadcasters have gone to successful careers in the Greater Cleveland area, both in radio and in television. In addition, the four local commercial television stations and numerous radio stations do game coverage and feature interviews on a selected basis.

The Baldwin-Wallace College student-athlete receives excellent local small college coverage both in terms of game coverage and hometown coverage by *The Plain Dealer* (Cleveland's major daily with a circulation of more than 500,000 homes), the *Chronicle-Telegram* (based in Elyria, Ohio), the *Morning Journal* (based in Lorain, Ohio), the *Beacon-Journal* (based in Akron, Ohio), the *Medina County Gazette* (based in Medina, Ohio), the *Sun Newspapers* (Cleveland's largest weekly newspaper serving the Greater Cleveland area) and a number of other daily and weekly publications in Northeast Ohio.

Overall, the sports information office at Baldwin-Wallace College offers the student-athlete the opportunity to receive maximum exposure at the small college level. In addition to giving the Yellow Jacket student-athlete the most comprehensive coverage available at the NCAA Division III level, the B-W sports information student assistant garners solid skills in writing, communications, marketing, promotion and publication layout and design. Overall, 14 former SID student assistants have gone on to sports information careers at either the NCAA Division I and I-AA level such as the University of Texas, Arizona State University, the University of Nebraska, the University of Arkansas, the University of Florida, Monmouth (N.J.), Kent State University, Eastern Michigan University and others. Others are involved with professional teams such as the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL and the Cleveland Force of the MISL.
