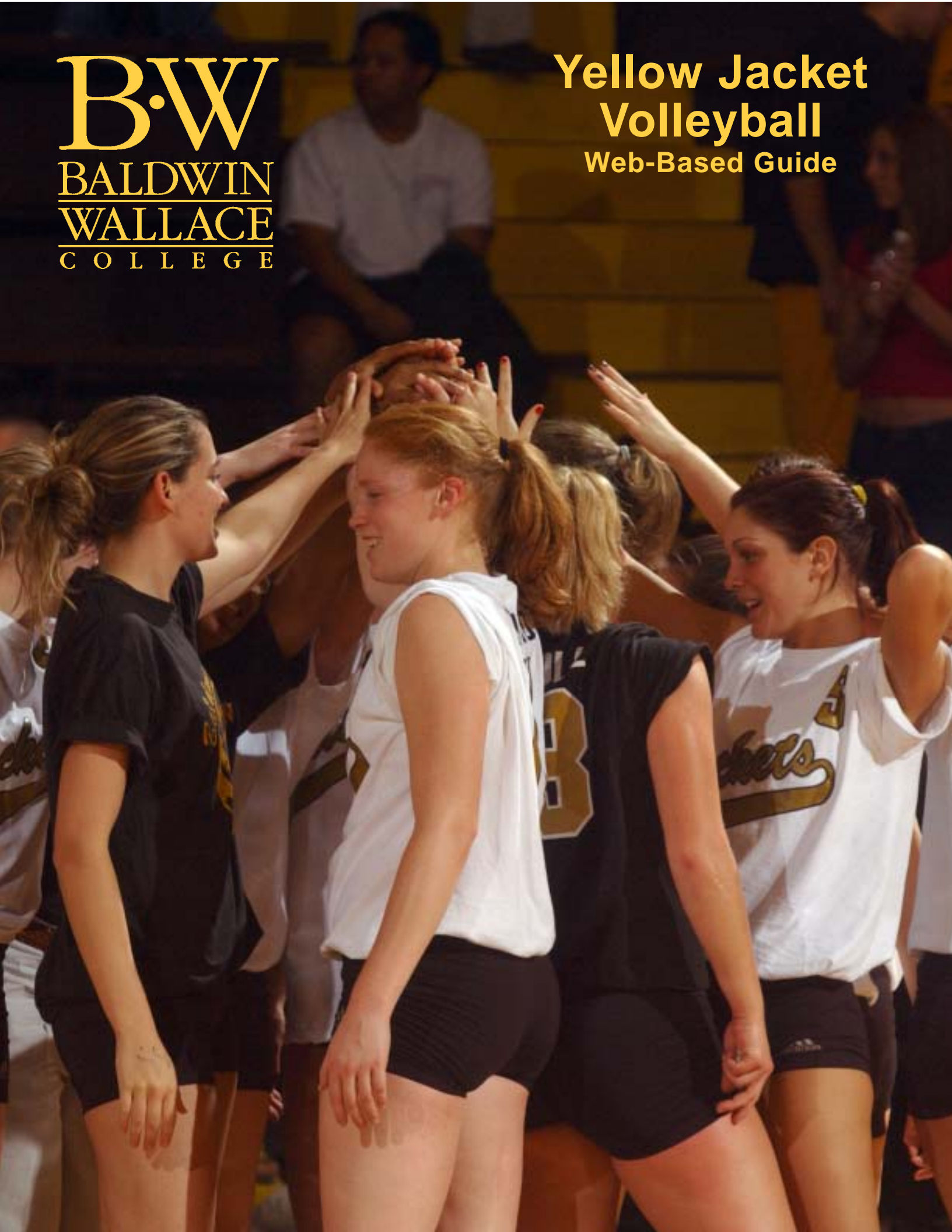

Head Coach Vicki Brault



Vicki Brault recently completed her 14th season as a collegiate head coach in 2004, and 10th at Baldwin-Wallace College. Brault has helped the Yellow Jacket program continue a tradition of excellence as one of the

best programs in the highly-competitive Ohio Athletic Conference, in the NCAA Division III Great Lakes Region and nationally in Division III.

In 14 years overall, Brault has compiled an impressive career mark of 275-178 and was ranked 37th on the all-time winning percentage list among Division III coaches prior to the 2004 season. Her career mark includes an outstanding 205-128 mark at B-W.

In 2004, B-W finished 22-13 overall and advanced to the OAC Championship match. Over the last eight seasons, Coach Brault's Yellow Jacket teams have compiled a winning mark of 187-86, including a 29-6 mark in 2001 and a 27-7 slate in 2002. In 2000 and 2001, B-W compiled a 54-16 record with an OAC regular season title in 2001 and both an OAC Tournament title and NCAA Division III National Tournament berth in 2000.

"Our program continues its goals

of winning an Ohio Athletic Conference title and participating in the NCAA Division III National Tourna-

ment," said Brault. "To do this each year, we know we must play against top-flight competition and be prepared to play well each week.

"We are both proud of the tradition that Marcia French began at Baldwin-Wallace in the late 1960s, 70s and into the 1980s, and are equally proud of the success of our current team," said Brault. "We know that we have a great challenge ahead of us."

Prior to arriving in Berea, Coach Brault was a successful head coach at the Division III level at Claremont (Calif.) McKenna-Mudd-Scripps College for four years. Brault guided her teams to a 70-50 record, two Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference titles and two appearances in the national tournament.

Coach Brault graduated from Western Michigan University and received her master's degree from Azusa Pacific University. In addition to coaching volleyball at Claremont McKenna-Mudd-Scripps, she was a physical education instructor and the head softball coach.

At B-W, Coach Brault also serves as an assistant softball coach.

Assistant Coaches Kevin Schaefer and Beverly Sadler



Kevin Schaefer completed his first season as an assistant coach and Beverly Sadler has now served eight seasons as an assistant for Yellow Jacket Head Coach Vicki Brault in 2004-

2005.

Schaefer is a '03 graduate of Baldwin-Wallace and served as a student assistant coach during the 2003 season. He also played on the B-W men's volleyball club team for four years and also was an assistant coach after graduation.

"Kevin Schaefer brings a wealth of playing experience having played for four years on the B-W men's club team along with many tournaments that he has played in," said Head Coach Vicki Brault. "Kevin was a volunteer student assistant last year with our program and was also a teaching assistant for my volleyball classes for three years."

"Kevin brings a positive coaching philosophy and optimism to the staff," said Brault. "He is very knowledgeable about the game and is a talented competitive athlete."

Sadler played at Cuyahoga Community College and Upper Iowa Col-



lege and is a former coach at Berkshire High School.

"Bev is also a solid coach who has been with our program for a number of years and is a tremendous assistant," said Brault.

"Bev has played the sport and is knowledgeable in all aspects. She also has a great rapport with our players and the rest of the staff. We are very fortunate to have two very outstanding assistant coaches."

The Facilities at Baldwin-Wallace College Are Among

The Baldwin-Wallace College student is afforded the opportunity to learn, exercise, practice and play in some of the finest facilities in small college athletics. In addition, as a student at B-W, each has an opportunity to use a group of facilities that are unparalleled in Division III athletics.

The Recreation Center with the Ursprung Gymnasium, Harrison Dillard Track and Natatorium, The George Finnie Stadium, the B-W Baseball Field, the "Pop" Collins Tennis Complex and other outdoor recreation and athletic areas at Baldwin-Wallace make the Yellow Jackets physical plant second to none among small colleges.

The Baldwin-Wallace College Recreation Center, dedicated on October 18, 1986, is a facility that benefits all B-W students, faculty, staff and alumni and is considered one of the top recreation facilities in the country.

The 150,000 square foot Rec Center serves as home for the health and physical education departments, all winter intercollegiate and intramural sports, as well as playing host for a number of amateur sporting events.

The Rec Center, which includes the Rudolph S. Ursprung Gymnasium, serves as the home of Yellow Jackets basketball,

volleyball and wrestling teams. Ursprung Gymnasium, which has housed B-W basketball since 1949, received a complete renovation in 1986. In addition to B-W playing in the Ursprung Gym, the Ohio High School Athletic Association has long

courts that can be used individually or in tandem for volleyball, basketball, tennis and other activities. On many occasions, the B-W basketball team has been playing a game while a wrestling match or an intramural basketball game was taking place in

used the B-W facility for its sectional and district tournaments for boys.

The fieldhouse consists of a 200-meter, six-lane track that is named for 1949 B-W graduate and four-time Olympic gold medalist Harrison Dillard. The track, with its Mondo surface, is both fast and comfortable for the walker, jogger or serious runner. Pits for the field events are also incorporated. The track surrounds three multi-purpose

the Rec Center fieldhouse.

The Harrison Dillard Track, along with the multi-purpose courts, have been home for the B-W indoor track teams, the John Summa Invitational Wrestling Tournament, the Ohio Sports Festival (basketball and wrestling venues) and many local high school track meets.

Also in the Rec Center is the B-W Natatorium, home to the Yellow Jacket

It seats 8,100 fans comfortably.

swimming and diving teams. The facility includes a 25-yard, six-lane pool with a one-meter diving board. The movable pool bottom has adaptive physical therapy applications and can be used by the disabled.

As part of the renovation of Ursprung, chairback seating and a new media center were constructed while training and physical therapy, laundry and eight locker rooms were added. Other features include a room for news media as well as exhibit and storage areas for the B-W Athletic Archives. The Archives give students, alumni, parents, friends and visitors to Baldwin-Wallace a glimpse of the rich tradition and heritage of Yellow Jacket teams and athletic greats.

The Finnie Stadium (pictured above) is one of the nations best small college stadiums for football and track and field. The Yellow Jacket men's and women's soccer teams also play at Finnie.

B-W has already hosted three NCAA Division III national championship track meets, numerous NCAA and Ohio High School Athletic Association football play-off games as well as being the home field to both Berea High School and Middleburg Heights Midpark High School. The Ohio Sports Festival/Ohio State Games also uses Finnie as both a regional and state championship site.

The B-W Baseball Field is located on the campus within walking distance of the

student dormitories. The facility has a manicured playing surface and seating for approximately 200 fans. The B-W Baseball Field has been the host site for four OAC Baseball Tournaments and is home to the nationally-ranked Yellow Jacket baseball squad.

The "Pop" Collins Tennis complex is named in honor of former B-W tennis coach

and teacher Arthur Worth Collins, the father of nationally renowned sportswriter and television tennis analyst Arthur "Bud" Collins '51. The facility is on campus and includes six courts which are lighted for night play.

In addition, the Yellow Jacket softball team plays at the Cuyahoga County Fairgrounds Field. Last spring was the first season for the Yellow Jackets at their new field.

Does such a strong group of facilities benefit the Yellow Jacket women's basketball program? Definitely! Practice time is available in the Ursprung Gym or the fieldhouse. That means the men and women can practice at the same time without conflict. Players have a wide variety of options for preseason and post season weight and conditioning programs.

"The entire Rec Center is a plus to our program," says head coach Cheri Harrer. "The playing, practice and dress facilities are among the finest in Division III. Having a number of courts in the fieldhouse gives us the opportunity to work with a greater number of players in our varsity and junior varsity programs.

"It is one of the finest training centers of any small college in the nation," says Harrer. "We feel the Rec Center has answered the needs of the B-W community."



The student-athlete is afforded the best in equipment to use in B-W's weight and training rooms. B-W also benefits from its affiliation with the Cleveland Clinic Sports Medicine Division. A clinic doctor is at virtually every athletic event.

The Volleyball Program is One of the Best in NCAA Division III

"Our volleyball program is one of the finest in NCAA Division III," said Head Coach Vicki Brault. "The goal each year is to win the prestigious Ohio Athletic Conference title and return to the NCAA Division III national tournament.

"In 2000 and 2001, we have had records of 25-10 and 29-6, we won the OAC Tournament title in 2000 and advanced to the national tournament and we tied for the OAC regular season title in 2003.

"Three years ago, we had a 27-7 mark and just missed making the national tournament. That's an 103-36 record the last four years," said Brault.

In 2004, B-W returned senior middle hitter Laura Leach (Norwalk) and defensive specialist Kari Kuhn (Amherst/Steele) to lead the squad.

Other top players included sophomore libero Kim Stoll (Norwalk/St. Paul) and

junior outside hitter Emily Albanese (Mentor). Stoll set the single-season school record for digs in a season with 754 in 2003. On the court, B-W had a 22-13 record and advanced to the OAC Championship match.

The Baldwin-Wallace College volleyball program is continually striving for excellence by stressing the development of the complete volleyball athlete capable of executing the basic skills to the highest degree. Yellow Jacket volleyball team ends another successful season in 2004



Graduated senior and two-time All-OAC setter Kerry Helm (Luckey, Ohio) is third all-time in B-W history with 3,027 assists.

BEREA, OHIO -- The Baldwin-Wallace College volleyball team ended another successful season Saturday (Nov. 6) when it placed second at the 2004 Ohio Athletic Conference Tournament which was held on the campus of Ohio Northern University.

B-W finished with a 22-13 overall record and did so with a very young team. The Yellow Jackets tied for second with Capital University in the 2004 OAC regular-season title chase. B-W earned the second seed ahead of Capital by virtue of a tie-breaker. The Yellow Jackets defeated the Crusaders earlier in the regular season to claim the season series and the number two spot in the tournament. In addition, the Jackets made it to the OAC Final Four for the fifth straight time and tournament runners-up for the second consecutive season.

Two outstanding senior players, **Laura Leach** and **Kari Kuhn** were key contributors to B-W's success this season. Both players served as team captains and provided much needed leader-

ship for the younger players. **Leach's** single-season kill total of 629 was just seven shy of breaking the school record of 636 set by B-W volleyball standout Cassie Palmer '04 last season. Her 1,350 career kill total ranks fourth all-time in school history and her 145 career solo block total ranks third. **Kuhn's** single-season total of 530 digs rank 12th most in school history and her 1,122 career digs rank eighth.

This year, B-W again played one of its most difficult schedules in school history. The Yellow Jackets faced seven teams ranked in the AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches Association) Top-25 including OAC rival Ohio Northern.

"I am so proud of this team, and especially of the two seniors," said Brault, now 275-178 in her career and 205-128 in 10 years at B-W. "Our seniors played their hearts out and left it all out on the court. We gave it a great run and played our best volleyball towards the end of the season."

The 2004 season was not only special for the players and seniors, but also for Head Coach Vicki Brault who won her 200th game in a 3-0 win against Marietta College on Oct. 16.

"Vicki has built our volleyball program into one of the best in the Ohio Athletic Conference and region," said B-W Athletic Director Steve Bankson, who oversees Brault and the volleyball program. "She is a hard-worker and very detail-oriented."

Even though winning her 200th game at B-W was important for Coach Brault, she never lost focus on the season and getting to the OAC Tournament with a possible spot in the NCAA Division III National Tournament.

"We had a very good season when you consider the type of competition that we played," continued Brault. "We did not shy away from anyone. Our players, especially our seniors, can walk away from the court with their heads held high. They have made a great contribution to B-W and its volleyball program."

On one weekend in particular, Brault's team was put to its toughest test of the season. On October 29-30, it traveled to Whitewater, Wisconsin and the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater. B-W played number three-ranked Washington (Mo.), 11th-ranked Wisconsin-Whitewater and 13th-ranked Wisconsin-Platteville.

In 35 matches, **Leach** topped the Yellow Jackets with 629 kills (5.03/game) and had the most blocks with 87, including 63 solo blocks. In addition, **Leach** topped the team in hitting at .337 and had 188 digs and 30 service aces. **Hills** was second with 384 kills, third in hitting at .261 and had 57 blocks to rank second. **Albanese** led the team with 60 aces, was second with 618 digs and with a .268 hitting percentage and third

with 51 blocks and 382 kills. Freshman outside hitter **Marten** was fourth on the squad with 182 kills. She also had 402 digs, 42 aces and 18 blocks. Freshman setter **Igarashi** topped the team with 1,088 assists (11.33/ game) and was fifth with 347 digs. **Stoll** led the team with a single-season school-record 859 digs and also had 36 aces. **Kuhn** was third with 530 digs and second with 50 aces. Freshman MH **Betsy Gilbert** was fourth in blocks with 38. **Gilbert** also had 92 kills and 62 digs.

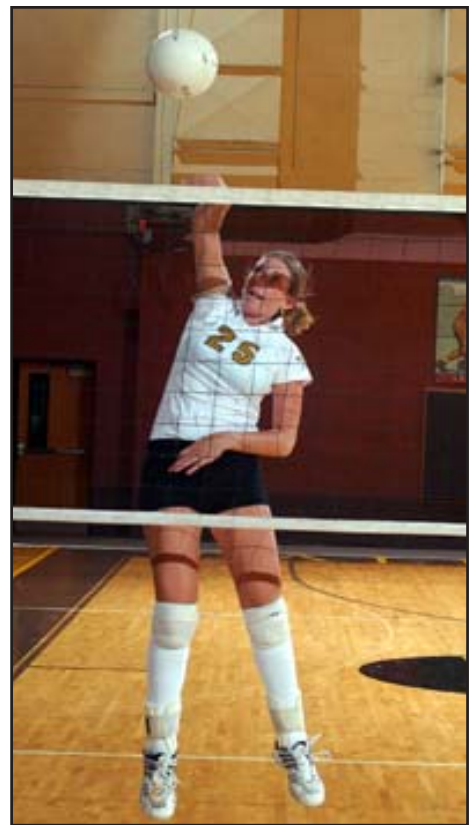
Leach, Albanese, Stoll and Hills Named All-Ohio Athletic Conference

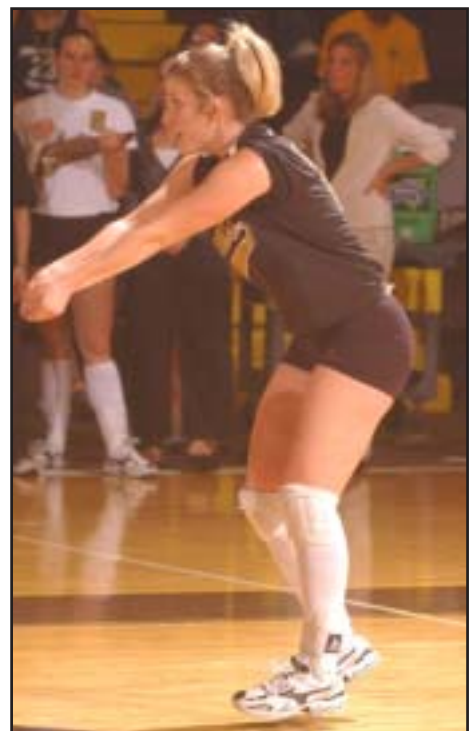
The Record Setters -- Sophomore libero **Kim Stoll** broke her own single-season school-record in digs with 859. She set the record as a freshman last year with 754 digs.

Two Baldwin-Wallace College Volleyball Student-Athletes are Tabbed as Academic All-Ohio Athletic Conference Selections

BEREA, OHIO — Two Baldwin-Wallace College volleyball student-athletes, senior middle hitter Laura Leach (Norwalk Senior High School) and sophomore libero Kim Stoll (Norwalk St. Paul H.S.), have been tabbed as Academic All-Ohio Athletic Conference players for their efforts both in the classroom and on the volleyball court.

Leach, who carries a 3.73 grade point average in political science and business administration, is both an outstanding volleyball player and student-athlete. This fall, Leach has already been named as a first-team All-Ohio Athletic Conference player and this is the second straight year that she has been tabbed Academic All-OAC. She was also named as a third-team CoSIDA Academic All-District IV player.

This season, Leach played in all 125

games. It marked her third selection to the All-OAC team having previously been named second-team All-OAC in 2002 and honorable mention All-OAC last season despite suffering a season-ending knee injury midway through the year. Leach finished the 2004 season with a team and OAC-leading 629 kills, a team-high 87 total blocks (63 solo and 24 assists) and a team-leading .337 hitting percentage. Her 629 kills fell seven shy of breaking the single-season school-record for kills in a season.

During her four-year career, Leach, accumulated 1,350 kills to rank fourth all-time at B-W. She also had 145 career solo blocks and ended her career with a .315 hitting percentage to rank third all-time in each category.

In the classroom, Leach is a Dean's List student and a member of the Alpha

Lambda, Pi Gamma Mu Social Science and Pi Sigma Alpha Political Science and Business honor societies.

Stoll, who carries a 3.51 grade point average in early childhood education, is a two-year starter at libero. Last week, Stoll was named as a second-team All-OAC selection as she had a school single-season record 859 defensive digs this fall. A year ago, Stoll set the mark with 754 digs. After two years in the Brown & Gold, Stoll already ranks fourth all-time at B-W with 1,613 digs.

The Yellow Jackets ended the 2004 season with a 22-13 overall record, a 7-2 mark during the OAC regular season to tie for second place and finished second at the OAC Tournament for the second consecutive year.

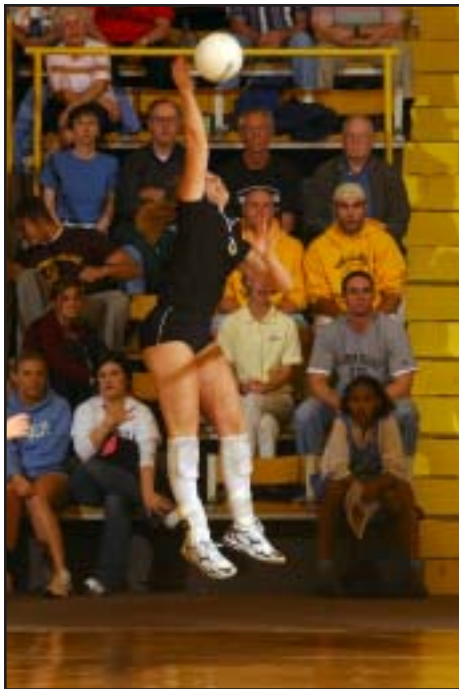

Four Volleyball Players Earn All-OAC Honors, Vicki Brault Named Coach of the Year and Kelsey Hills is Co-Rookie of the Year

BEREA, OHIO -- Four Baldwin-Wallace College volleyball players, senior middle hitter Laura Leach (Norwalk/ Senior), junior rightside player Emily Albanese (Mentor), sophomore libero Kim Stoll (Norwalk/ St. Paul) and freshman outside hitter Kelsey Hills (Toledo/ St. Ursula), all earned All-Ohio Athletic Conference honors for their performances during the 2004 regular season and OAC Tournament. In addition, Head Coach Vicki Brault was named the 2004 OAC Coach of the Year and Hills was tabbed as the OAC co-Rookie of the Year.

The Yellow Jackets ended the 2004 season with a 22-13 overall record, a 7-2 mark during the OAC regular season to tie for second place and finished second at the OAC Tournament for the second consecutive year. B-W again played one of its toughest schedules in school history facing seven teams ranked in the AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches Association) Top 25.

"We had a very successful season," said Brault, who surpassed the 200-win mark during her 10-years at B-W and led the Yellow Jackets to their seventh 20-win campaign in the past eight years.



Freshman Kelsey Hills (Toledo/St. Ursula) finished second on the team in kills (384), hitting percentage (.261) and total blocks (57). For her efforts, she was named OAC "Co-Rookie of the Year."

"We had some strong performances by our two seniors, and our younger players learned, matured and got better and better as the season progressed."

Brault was named OAC "Coach of the Year" for the second time in her career. She was also named "Coach of the Year" in 2000. In her 10 seasons in Berea, Brault has produced a 205-128 record. During her 14-year collegiate career, she is 275-178 overall. Brault has coached the Yellow Jackets to its only two OAC regular season titles (2001 and 2003), its only OAC Tournament title (2000) and two NCAA Division III National Tournament berths (2000 and 2002). Earlier this season, Brault became only the second coach in school history to win 200 games when her Yellow Jackets defeated Marietta College on October 16.

Leach was named first-team All-OAC this season playing in all 125 games. It marked her third selection to the All-OAC team having previously been named second-team All-OAC in 2002 and honorable mention All-OAC last season despite suffering a season-ending knee injury midway through the year. Leach finished the 2004 season with a team and OAC-leading 629 kills, a team-high 87 total blocks (63 solo and 24 assists) and a team-leading .337 hitting percentage. Her 629 kills fell seven shy of breaking the single-season school-record for kills in a season.

During her four-year career, Leach, who was an Academic All-OAC performer last year and has already been tabbed as a third-team CoSIDA Academic All-District IV player this year, accumulated 1,350 kills to rank fourth all-time at B-W. She also had 145 career solo blocks and ended her career with a .315 hitting percentage to rank third all-time.

"Laura had an outstanding career," said Brault. "I couldn't thank her enough for her outstanding senior leadership. Laura was both an outstanding player and captain."

Albanese was named to the All-OAC team for the first time, earning second-team All-OAC honors. She played in 122 games and recorded 382 kills to rank on the team and had a .267 hitting percentage. She led the team in service aces with 60, was second on the team in digs with 618 and solo blocks with 41. In addition, Albanese's 66 set assists

ranked third on the team. In three years, Albanese has 619 kills, 934 digs, 126 blocks, 83 aces, 73 set assists and a .196 hitting percentage.

Stoll had another record-setting season as she played in all 125 games. She earned second-team All-OAC honors for the first time in her career. This season, Stoll broke her own single-season school-record for digs with 859. She had 754 as a freshman a year ago. She also added 36 service aces to rank fourth on the team. Stoll's two-year total of 1,613 digs already ranks fourth all-time.

Hills made an immediate impact for the Yellow Jackets as a freshman. For her efforts, she was selected honorable mention All-OAC and as the OAC Co-Rookie of the Year. She played in 122 games as an outside hitter and had 384 kills with a .261 hitting percentage and 57 total blocks (38 solo and 19 assists) to rank second on the team in all three categories.

Baldwin-Wallace College Senior Laura Leach Named to the AVCA All-American and All-Great Lakes Region Teams in Volleyball

BEREA, OHIO -- Baldwin-Wallace College senior middle hitter Laura Leach (Norwalk/ Senior) has been named to the American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) All-American and All-Great Lakes Region teams.

Leach is the third B-W volleyball player to earn All-American honors in school history and this is Leach's first selection to the All-Region team. Former volleyball standouts Cassie Palmer '04 and Ann Lucak '84 were the other two Yellow Jacket All-Americans.

Leach helped the Yellow Jackets finish with a 22-13 overall record and a second-place finish in the Ohio Athletic Conference during the regular season with a 7-2 record. B-W also fin-

ished second in the OAC Tournament. B-W again played one of its toughest schedules in school history facing seven teams ranked in the AVCA (American Volleyball Coaches Association) Top 25.

This season, Leach played in all 125 games. In addition to being named All-Region, she is a three-time All-OAC player and two-time Academic All-OAC pick. Leach finished the 2004 season with a team and OAC-leading 629 kills, a team-high 87 total blocks (63 solo and 24 assists) and a team-leading .337 hitting percentage. Her 629 kills fell seven shy of breaking the single-season school-record for kills in a season.

During her four-year career, Leach, accumulated 1,350 kills to rank fourth

all-time at B-W. She also had 145 career solo blocks and ended her career with a .315 hitting percentage to rank third all-time.

In the classroom, Leach carries a 3.73 grade point average in political science and business and is a Dean's List student and a member of the Alpha Lambda, Pi Gamma Mu Social Science and Pi Sigma Alpha Political Science and Business honor societies. Leach was also a CoSIDA third-team Academic All-District IV choice.

The Ohio Athletic Conference; the third oldest conference in the nation



Entering its 102nd year, the Ohio Athletic Conference will look to continue its prominence during the 2004-05 year. In 2003-2004, the OAC was once again represented well at the national level, both academically and athletically.

During the 2003-04 season the OAC advanced 11 teams to the NCAA Division III "Sweet 16", including Wilmington College winning the National Title in women's basketball. Mount Union College finished runner-up in football and the John Carroll University men's basketball squad finished third. Three teams finished in the "Elite Eight" at the NCAA's: Ohio Northern University in volleyball, Muskingum College in softball and Wilmington in indoor track and field; and five teams ended their seasons in the "Sweet 16": Baldwin-Wallace College in football, Wilmington in women's soccer, JCU in men's soccer and wrestling and Otterbein College in men's golf. Individually, Mount Union's Eddis Singleton and Wilmington's Emily Herring both became national champions in their respective events, the 50-yard freestyle in swimming and the high jump in track and field.

Individually, the Conference was represented by 56 All-Americans, 32 men and 24 women, and 13 Academic All-Americans to go along with a bevy of regional and national honors for our student-athletes and coaches. The Conference also had an athlete earn CoSIDA Academic All-America Team Member-of-the-Year honors in her respective sport.

The OAC, the third oldest conference in college athletics, is predated only by the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (1888) and the Big Ten (1895). The Conference is older than the World Series and even the NCAA itself and has survived two world wars, the Great Depression, the Korean War and the Vietnam Conflict. From a modest beginning of six charter members in 1902, the OAC grew to as many as 24 members in the mid-1920s.

Through the years a total of 30 colleges and universities at one time or another have been members of the OAC. Currently the Conference consists of 10 members, including Baldwin-Wallace College, Capital University, Heidelberg College, John Carroll University, Marietta College, Mount Union College, Muskingum College, Ohio Northern

University, Otterbein College and Wilmington College. Wilmington became the 31st OAC member school, on July 1, 2000.

In the OAC's first year of existence, 1902, the first Conference champion was crowned. Case Tech won the football title with a 5-0-0 record. Outdoor track was added a year later and a third sport, cross country, became a Conference sport in 1914. More sports were steadily added to the OAC's repertoire throughout the years, culminating in the addition of women's sports in 1984. The Conference currently sponsors championships in 21 sports, 11 men's and 10 women's.

The enrollments at the 10 OAC institutions range from 1,200 to 4,500. All of the schools were founded in the 19th century and have long and outstanding academic reputations. While maintaining these high academic standards, Ohio Athletic Conference athletic teams and athletes have consistently enjoyed a great deal of success on a regional and national level. The athletic competition is viewed not as an end in itself, but as an extension of the educational programs.

Admission to B-W is offered on a selective basis. Each application is reviewed independently on its own merits, with careful consideration of course work, class rank, grade point averages, recommendations, test results (SAT or ACT) and extracurricular activities. To apply for admission, we encourage you to complete the application between **September** and **March** of your senior year.

A good high school preparation for B-W includes four years of English, and at least three years of math, social science and natural science, two years of foreign language, and three years of additional academic electives.

Candidates are considered as soon as all application requirements have been met, with notification usually within four to six weeks after their credentials are received.

An Exceptional Value

B-W is committed to making college affordable. In fact, your chances of receiving some form of financial assistance at B-W are excellent. Nearly two-thirds of our current students receive B-W need-based aid; and more than 90 percent receive assistance in some form.

Your first step in the financial aid process is to complete the F.A.F.S.A. (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). This should be completed no later than March 1st. After you have been admitted to B-W and the F.A.F.S.A. report has been received and processed, you will receive your award. Typically this will consist of gift assistance (need-based grant and scholarship), low interest federal loans and work study employment.

The Baldwin-Wallace College volleyball student-athlete is one of the best publicized in all of small college and NCAA Division III athletics. Several factors help this to happen.

Its location, its national and conference affiliation and philosophy of athletics, its administration and coaches and its support of the student-athlete all play large roles in telling others about B-W and the successes of its student-athletes.

Baldwin-Wallace College is a small, private, liberal arts college located 12 miles southwest of Cleveland, Ohio. While being in the small and progres-sive local comm-unity of Berea,

B-W student-athletes benefit from being close to a major urban area such as Greater Cleveland/Akron. B-W athletics receive support both in Cleveland and Akron and in the Berea community itself.

Being a member of the prestigious Ohio Athletic Conference and playing NCAA Division III athletics also is an advantage. Coaches who are teachers first forge a solid commitment to the Division III philosophy of the student-athlete. Baldwin-Wallace also is proud of its athletic heritage and the fact that it has produced the third most small college CoSIDA-GTE College Division Academic All-Americans since 1984. In 1997, B-W had three Academic All-Americans, including men's basketball player Kevin Braaten (Strongsville, Ohio) '97. The year prior, men's basketball player Brian Higley '96 (Stow, Ohio) was tabbed as a first-team Academic All-American. Overall, the Yellow Jacket men's program has produced four Academic All-American student-athletes since head coach Steve Bankson took over the program.

Support in terms of facilities, equipment and transportation and in staff provides the Baldwin-Wallace student-athlete with a luxury not enjoyed at many other schools.

One part of that support is in the area of sports information. A diligent staff of B-W sport information student assistants and sport management majors work with the director to publicize B-W and its coaches and student-athletes in 20 NCAA Division III sports.

The students learn first-hand about publicizing a program by updating the internet website, writing hometown press releases and doing feature stories, doing game and cumulative statistics as well as statistical analysis, game and

special event programs, recruiting brochures and media guides, contacting local, state and national media sources prior to and after each game and promoting and administering special events during athletic contests.

Each Yellow Jacket volleyball student-athlete receives a preseason, mid-season and postseason hometown press release which is sent to the individual student-athlete hometown newspaper. When the student-athletes fill out a preseason questionnaire, each is asked to list his or her hometown newspaper.

After each varsity volleyball game, the internet website is updated, a FAX is sent to B-W's base of local, state and national media that regularly cover or have requested B-W coverage. In addition, hometown facsimile messages about individual performances are also sent either the night of the contest or the next day.

The day following an athletic event, statistics are updated and made available to all requesting the information.

Campus radio station WBWC, 88.3 FM, broadcasts all home and away football and basketball games as well as covering all other Yellow Jacket sporting events, press conferences or announcements on a selected basis. ***All Yellow Jacket men's and women's basketball games are also broadcast over the internet website at www.bw.edu/athletics.*** A number of former B-W student broadcasters have gone to successful careers in the Greater Cleveland area, both in radio and in television. In addition, the four local commercial television stations and numerous radio stations do game coverage and feature interviews on a selected basis.

The Baldwin-Wallace College student-athlete receives excellent local small college coverage both in terms of game coverage and hometown coverage by *The Plain Dealer* (Cleveland's major daily with a circulation of more than 500,000 homes), the *Chronicle-Telegram* (based in Elyria, Ohio), the *Morning Journal* (based in Lorain, Ohio), the *Beacon-Journal* (based in Akron, Ohio), the *Medina County Gazette* (based in Medina, Ohio), the *Sun News-papers* (Cleveland's largest weekly newspaper serving the Greater Cleveland area) and a number of other daily and weekly publications in Northeast Ohio.

Overall, the sports information office at Baldwin-Wallace College offers the student-athlete the opportunity to receive maximum exposure at the small college level. In addition to giving the Yellow Jacket student-athlete the most comprehensive coverage available at the NCAA Division III level, the B-W sports information student assistant garners solid skills in writing, communications, marketing, promotion and publication layout and design. Overall, 14 former SID student assistants have gone on to sports information careers at either the NCAA Division I and I-AA level such as the University of Texas, Arizona State University, the University of Nebraska, the University of Arkansas, the University of Florida, Monmouth (N.J.), Kent State University, Eastern Michigan University and others. Others are involved with professional teams such as the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL and the Cleveland Force of the MISL.
