

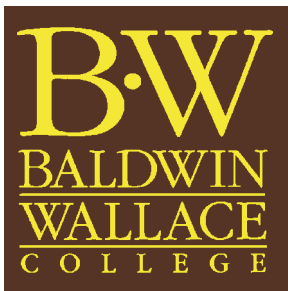

On the Cover of the 2004-2005 Baldwin-Wallace College Women's Golf Postseason Web Guide is freshman Molly Scheetz (Canton/Perry) [upper left] and sophomore Sarah Hacker (New Albany, Ind./ Our Lady of Providence) [lower right]. Scheetz made an immediate impact as a freshman during the fall and spring seasons. She tied for third at the 2005 OAC Tournament and earned All-OAC honors. Scheetz led the team in stroke average this spring with 88.75 and had the second-best average during the fall at 89.60.

Hacker has been one of the more consistent players for the Yellow Jacket women's golf team. She averaged 88.88 strokes per round this spring which was second best on the team. Hacker tied for fifth place individually at this year's conference tournament earning All-OAC honors for the second consecutive season.

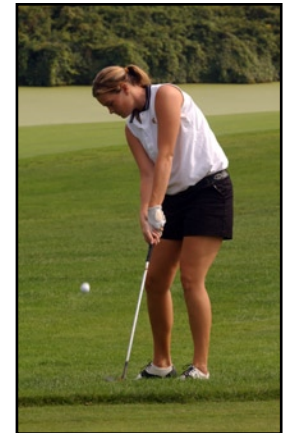

The Ohio Athletic Conference; The Third Oldest Conference in the Nation



The Ohio Athletic Conference, the third oldest conference in college athletics, is predated only by the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (1888) and the Big Ten (1895). The Conference is older than the World Series and even the NCAA itself and has survived two world wars, the Great Depression, the Korean War and the Vietnam Conflict. From a modest beginning of six charter members in 1902, the OAC grew to as many as 24 members in the mid-1920s.

Through the years a total of 31 colleges and universities at one time or another have been members of the OAC. Currently the Conference consists of 10 members, including Baldwin-Wallace College, Capital University, Heidelberg College, John Carroll University, Marietta College, Mount Union College, Muskingum College, Ohio Northern University, Otterbein College and Wilmington College. Wilmington became the 31st OAC member school, on July 1, 2000.

In the OAC's first year of existence, 1902, the first Conference champion was crowned — Case Tech won the football ti-

tle with a 5-0-0 record. Outdoor track was added a year later and a third sport, cross country, became a Conference sport in 1914. More sports were steadily added to the OAC's repertoire throughout the years, culminating in the addition of women's sports in 1984. The Conference currently sponsors championships in 21 sports, 11 men's and 10 women's.

The enrollments at the 10 OAC institutions range from 1,200 to 4,500. All of the schools were founded in the 19th century and have long and outstanding academic reputations.

While maintaining these high academic standards, Ohio Athletic Conference athletic teams and athletes have consistently enjoyed a great deal of success on a regional and national level. The athletic competition is viewed not as an end in itself, but as an extension of the educational programs.

During the 2004-05 sports season, seven OAC schools finished in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) "Sweet 16" of their respective sports. During the fall, Mount Union football finished

in the "Final Four", while the Wilmington men's soccer team ended its season in the "Sweet 16". The winter season brought the OAC a pair of "Sweet 16" appearances, the John Carroll men's basketball team and the Otterbein men's track and field squad. Otterbein paved the way in the spring sports season with a pair of "Sweet 16" stops in baseball and men's golf, and the Muskingum softball team ended its year in the "Elite Eight" for the third straight season.

Individually, the Conference was represented by 58 All-Americans, including a pair of National Champions in track and field. A total of 40 men and 18 women were named All-Americans throughout the 2004-05 year. Academically, the OAC boasted 17 CoSIDA ESPN The Magazine Academic All-Americans, along with a bevy of regional and national honors for our coaches. Otterbein's Chris Swanson became a National Champion in the pole vault at the 2005 NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships, while Wilmington's Doreen Nagawa captured the National Title in the Triple Jump at the 2005 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Kelly Warnke Becomes New Head Women's Golf Coach and Assistant Women's Basketball Coach

Kelly Warnke joins the Baldwin-Wallace College athletic program in 2005-2006 as the Head Women's Golf Coach and Assistant Basketball Coach. She comes to B-W following a five-year stint as the Assistant Women's Basketball Coach at the University of Wisconsin at Oshkosh.

A native of Casco, Wisconsin, Warnke has a wealth of experience in many areas, including teaching, coaching and counseling students and student-athletes. She has six years of college coaching experience, five years of experience working in Student Affairs and two years as a course instructor. As a four-year varsity student-athlete at U-W Oshkosh, Warnke played on three Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference championship teams, three squads that advanced to the NCAA Division III National Tournament and a team that won

a Division III national title.

"We are pleased to have Kelly join our staff," said Head Women's Basketball Coach and Senior Women's Administrator Cheri Harrer. "Kelly has a wealth of experience at a quality institution that has been successful.

"Kelly will be our women's golf coach and assist me with the women's basketball program," said Harrer. "She has both the skill and ability to make an impact at Baldwin-Wallace College. We are pleased that Kelly is going to be a part of our athletic family."

While serving as an assistant at her alma mater, Warnke helped U-W Oshkosh to a five-year record of 104-30 and two WIAC championships (2001 and 2004). Prior to coaching there, she spent one year as an assistant at the University of Evans-

ville (Ind.) in 1999-2000 and as a strength and conditioning intern at Arizona State University in 1999.

As a student-athlete, Warnke was both a solid player and leader and served as a team captain in 1998-99. She played on U-W Oshkosh's NCAA Division III national championship team and WIAC championship squads in 1996, 1998 and 1999 and helped the Titans compile an impressive record of 107-8.

In the classroom, Warnke is a strong believer in a quality education and compiled a 3.4 undergraduate grade point average with a Bachelor of Science degree in Exercise Fitness Management and a minor in Wellness Promotion.. Warnke earned her Master's of Science Education degree with an emphasis in Student Affairs in College Counseling from U-W Oshkosh in 2003

and carried a graduate school grade point average of 3.85 overall.

At B-W, Warnke joins a Yellow Jacket women's basketball program that is among the most successful in Division III. Under Harrer's direction, B-W has won five of the past seven Ohio Athletic Conference regular season and four of the past seven

OAC Tournament titles and has advanced to the Division III national tourney eight of the last 10 years, including a pair of "Elite Eight" finishes. In golf, B-W also has had one of the top programs in Division III since its inception, including two OAC titles and two appearances at the NCAA Division III national tournament.

"The women's basketball program at Baldwin-Wallace College has a reputation that stretches across the nation in Division III athletics and I am excited to have the opportunity to be a part of it," said Warnke.

The Baldwin-Wallace College Women's Golf Team Places Second at the 2005 Ohio Athletic Conference Championships

BEREA, OHIO -- The Baldwin-Wallace College women's golf team placed second of eight schools at the 2005 Ohio Athletic Conference Championship Tournament at the Big Met Golf Course in Fairview Park, Ohio. B-W was the host school.

The Yellow Jackets carded a four-player, 708-stroke total on the par-72, 5,828-yard Big Met layout, including a 658-stroke total on the first day and a 650-stroke total on the second day. Each team consists of five players who score with the

top four scores counting toward the team total.

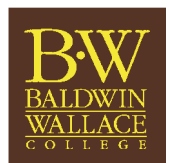
B-W was led by freshman Molly Scheetz (Canton/ Perry) who placed third individually and fired rounds of 88 and a career-best 82 to total 170 strokes and earn All-OAC accolades. Sophomore Sarah Hacker (New Albany, Indiana/ Our Lady of Providence) finished second for B-W and carded rounds of 84 and 88 strokes, respectively for a 172-stroke total and was in a fifth place tie and earned All-OAC hon-

ors for the second straight year.

In addition to Molly Scheetz and Hacker, junior two-time All-OAC player Emily Scheetz (Canton/ Perry) had a 182-stroke total to place in a tie for 15th, junior All-OAC player Lauren Buckner (Westlake) had rounds of 100 and then 90 for a 190 total to place 25th and senior Mary Farrell (Middleburg Heights/ Parma Heights Holy Name) had rounds of 94 and 103 for a 197-stroke total to place 30th.



Baldwin-Wallace College Hosted First-Ever Ohio Cup Tournament This Past Spring



BEREA, OHIO -- The Baldwin-Wallace College women's golf program hosted the first-ever Ohio Cup Golf Championships this past spring at the Pine Hills Golf Course in Hinckley, Ohio.

The tournament is similar to the Professional Golfers Association "Ryder Cup" competition. A maximum of 12 schools are allowed to compete and each school represented consists of six players.

Two players play nine holes of alternating stroke play followed by nine holes of match play. Two players play nine holes of best ball followed by nine holes of match play and two players play nine holes of stroke play followed by nine holes of match play.

Each match won by an individual or two-player team, results in a determined

number of points depending upon place of finish. The first school to accumulate a team-total 48 points wins an award which is engraved and will be kept by the winning team until the following year.

"We were delighted to host the first-ever Ohio Cup at Pine Hills," said women's athletic director Cheri Harrer. "It was an outstanding event."

The Pine Hills Golf Club is a par 73 course and tests each player's ability negotiating all 5,952 yards. The course has been selected as one of "Golf Digest's Places to Play."

The Yellow Jacket Women's Golf Program Has Had National Success at the Division III Level

BEREA, OHIO -- The Baldwin-Wallace College women's golf program begins its eighth season of existence in 2005-2006 and already is among the best programs in NCAA Division III.

In the last four years, the Yellow Jacket women have captured 11 invitational tournament championship titles, including two Ohio Athletic Conference crowns and placed in the Top 10 at the 2000 and 2001 NCAA Division III National Championship tournaments.

Under the direction of first-year Head Coach Kelly Warnke, the 2005-2006 edition of the B-W program will return four key players. They are seniors Lauren Buckner and Emily Scheetz, junior Sarah Hacker, and sophomore Molly Scheetz. The squad is looking to improve individually and help B-W return to the national tourney.

The key to the 2005-2006 season will be the continued development of these ladies, who have potential to be great B-W golfers.

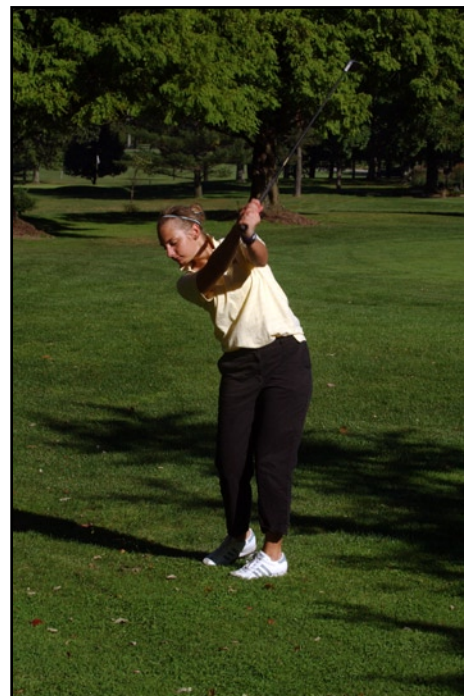
"We have two outstanding seniors and

it will be key for them to step up and continue their incredible play if we are to challenge for another Ohio Athletic Conference title," said Warnke.

"Our goal is to win the OAC Championship and qualify for the 2006 NCAA Division III National Championship Tournament," said Warnke. "We have a dedicated, strong core-group returning, and we have great young talent that will definitely contribute to the golf program at Baldwin-Wallace."

Along with playing tough Division III golf programs, this year's schedule will include top challengers from both the NCAA Division I and II levels.

"We believe in order to be a better golf team, we must step up to the mental challenge and learn to play well against tough competition from all levels," said Warnke. "That is why we travel to premier tournaments in Florida, Michigan, South Carolina and Indiana."

The Baldwin-Wallace Women Annually Compete for a Women's Golf Title in the Ohio Athletic Conference

Baldwin-Wallace College belongs to the 10-team Ohio Athletic Conference for men and women. Long considered one of the finest small college conferences in the nation, the OAC offers competition in 21 NCAA Division III sports, including golf for men and women.

Since its inception as an OAC sport in 2000, the Baldwin-Wallace College women have been one of the OAC's top programs. The Yellow Jackets won the OAC title in both 2000 and 2001, and have placed either second or third every year since.

In 2000, the Yellow Jacket women won the OAC title and placed seventh at the inaugural NCAA Division III Women's Golf National Championship Tournament. In 2001, B-W repeated as OAC champions and finished 10th at the NCAA tourney at

Seven Yellow Jacket Student-Athletes Named to the Women's Academic All-Ohio Athletic Conference At-Large Teams

BEREA, OHIO — Seven Baldwin-Wallace College student-athletes have been named to the women's Academic All-Ohio Athletic Conference At-Large teams, recognizing each for their performances in the classroom and on the field of play.

To be eligible for Academic All-OAC accolades, a student-athlete must have at least a 3.25 cumulative grade point average, be a starter or key reserve and be in at least his/her second year of participation in the sport. To view the women's At-Large Academic All-OAC teams, please click here.

Two Yellow Jackets were named to the women's Academic All-OAC At-Large team. They were senior swimmers Lisa Fox (Copley) and Kristen Showalter (Bowling Green). In addition, sophomore women's tennis player Andrea Isaac (New Philadelphia), junior swimmers Mary Dye (Twinsburg), Emily Wood (Carrollton), sophomore swimmers Sara Gombash (Perrysburg/ Notre Dame Academy) and Julie Stancliff (Erie, Pa./ McDowell) were selected honorable mention Academic All-OAC.

Showalter is an early childhood education major who carries a 3.50 GPA and competes in the butterfly and middle distance and distance freestyle events. Show-

alter is an 24-time All-OAC award winner and eight-time OAC Individual champion. She currently holds three individual school records (200 free, 500 free and 1000 free) and is a member of two record-setting relay teams (400-yard medley and 400-yard free relay).

Fox, a mathematics and business administration major, finished her career with a 3.55 GPA and also competes in the backstroke and IM events. She is a five-time All-OAC award recipient and was the OAC Champion in the 100-yard backstroke and a member of the school record setting 200-yard medley relay team in 2003-2004.

Isaac, a public relations major, carries a 3.27 GPA and is one of the best women's tennis players to wear the Brown & Gold. This season, she set a B-W single-season school-record for wins in both singles and doubles play. Individually, Isaac had a 22-5 singles mark and her 22 wins are a school-record. In doubles play, Isaac combined with freshman Meggie Glassburn '08 for a school-record 22 wins and a 22-6 slate. As a freshman in 2003-2004, she set a Yellow Jacket freshman record for wins with 19 and set a school single-season record for winning percentage at .950 overall. Isaac was also the OAC "Freshman of the Year" last season.

Dye carries a 3.85 GPA in early childhood education, and is a member of the women's swimming team. She competes in the freestyle and breaststroke events. She was a member of the All-Conference 200-yard freestyle and 400-yard freestyle relay teams at the Ohio Athletic Conference Championships last season. Dye recorded the fourth fastest time in school history in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:12.30) and 200-yard breaststroke (2:37.72).

Wood, a business administration major, carries a 3.50 GPA and is also a member of the women's swimming team. She is a nine-time All-OAC award winner. This season, Wood was a member of the All-OAC 200-yard freestyle relay team (1:42.81), 400-yard freestyle relay team (3:44.61) and also earned All-OAC individual honors with a third place finish in the 200-yard breaststroke (2:35.94). Last season, Wood was a member of the school record setting 200-yard medley relay team (1:53.88). This is her first selection as Academic All-OAC.

Gombash carries a 3.53 GPA in neuroscience and biology and is a member of the women's swim team. She is a six-time

All-OAC award winner including an OAC individual champion in the 100-yard butterfly (1:00.28) and in the 200-yard butterfly (2:15.03) which she also set a new conference record. Gombash holds two school records in the 100-yard butterfly (59.57) and the 200-yard butterfly (2:13.84). Last

season, she qualified provisionally for the NCAA swimming and diving championships in the 100-yard butterfly.

Stancliff, carries a 3.72 GPA in athletic training and pre-physical therapy. She is a four-time All-OAC and individual champion in the one-meter and three-meter diving

events. Stancliff is also the OAC female "Diver of the Year" for the second straight year. As a freshman in 2003-2004, she earned All-American honors in the one-meter diving event at the NCAA Championships.

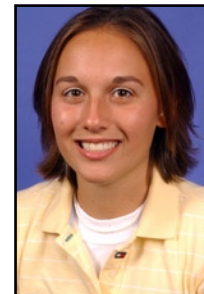

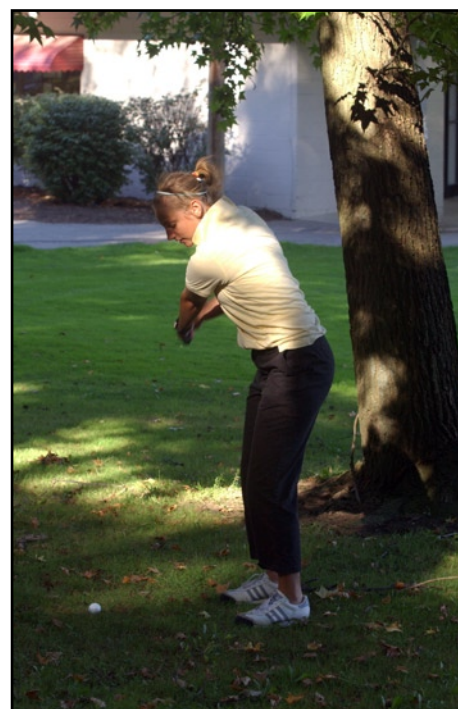

The Facilities at Baldwin-Wallace College Are Among

The Baldwin-Wallace College student is afforded the opportunity to learn, exercise, practice and play in some of the finest facilities in small college athletics. In addition, as a student at B-W, each has an opportunity to use a group of facilities that are unparalleled in Division III athletics.

The Recreation Center with the Ursprung Gymnasium, Harrison Dillard Track and Natatorium, The George Finnie Stadium, the B-W Baseball Field, the "Pop" Collins Tennis Complex and other outdoor recreation and athletic areas at Baldwin-Wallace make the Yellow Jackets physical plant second to none among small colleges.

The Baldwin-Wallace College Recreation Center, dedicated on October 18, 1986, is a facility that benefits all B-W students, faculty, staff and alumni and is considered one of the top recreation facilities in the country.

The 150,000 square foot Rec Center serves as home for the health and physical education departments, all winter intercollegiate and intramural sports, as well as playing host for a number of amateur sporting events.

The Rec Center, which includes the Rudolph S. Ursprung Gymnasium, serves as the home of Yellow Jackets basketball, volleyball and wrestling teams. Ursprung Gymnasium, which has housed B-W basketball since

1949, received a complete renovation in 1986. In addition to B-W playing in the Ursprung Gym, the Ohio High School Athletic Association has long used the B-W facility for its sectional and district tournaments for boys.

basketball, tennis and other activities. On many occasions, the B-W basketball team has been playing a game while a wrestling match or an intramural basketball game was taking place in the Rec Center fieldhouse.

The Harrison Dillard Track, along with



The Ursprung Gymnasium was renovated in 1986 and seats more than 2,800 fans for basketball, volleyball and wrestling. The basketball stands are situated away from the floor with an excellent view from any angle.

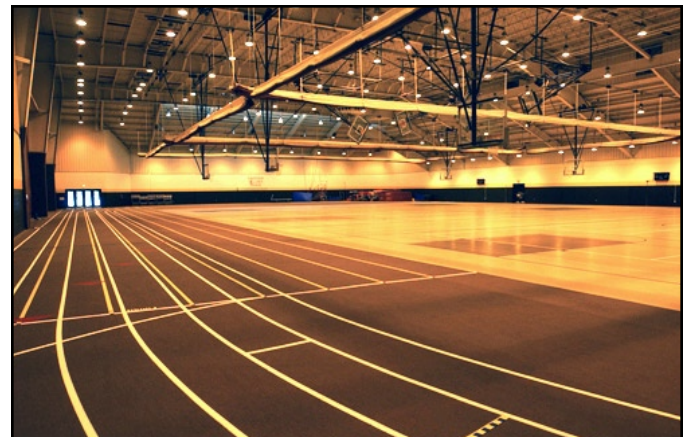
The fieldhouse consists of a 200-meter, six-lane track that is named for 1949 B-W graduate and four-time Olympic gold medalist Harrison Dillard. The track, with its Mondo surface, is both fast and comfortable for the walker, jogger or serious runner. Pits for the field events are also incorporated. The track surrounds three multi-purpose courts that can be used individually or in tandem for volleyball,

the multi-purpose courts, have been home for the B-W indoor track teams, the John Summa Invitational Wrestling Tournament, the Ohio Sports Festival (basketball and wrestling venues) and many local high school track meets.

Also in the Rec Center is the B-W Natatorium, home to the Yellow Jacket

It has also served as the site for five Division III national track meets, the Pan Am Games qualifying meet, the Ohio Games and the A.A.U. Junior Olympic championships. It seats 8,100 fans comfortably.

swimming and diving teams. The facility includes a 25-yard, six-lane pool with a one-meter diving board. The movable pool bottom has adaptive physical therapy applications and can be used by the disabled.

As part of the renovation of Ursprung, chairback seating and a new media center were constructed while training and physical therapy, laundry and eight locker rooms were added. Other features include a room for news media as well as exhibit and storage areas for the B-W Athletic Archives. The Archives give students, alumni, parents, friends and visitors to Baldwin-Wallace a glimpse of the rich tradition and heritage of Yellow Jacket teams and athletic greats.

The Finnie Stadium (pictured above) is one of the nations best small college stadiums for football and track and field. The Yellow Jacket men's and women's soccer teams also play at Finnie.

B-W has already hosted three NCAA Division III national championship track meets, numerous NCAA and Ohio High School Athletic Association football playoff games as well as being the home field to both Berea High School and Middleburg Heights Midpark High School. The Ohio Sports Festival/Ohio State Games also uses Finnie as both a regional and state championship site.

The B-W Baseball Field is located on the campus within walking distance of the student dormitories. The facility has a

manicured playing surface and seating for approximately 200 fans. The B-W Baseball Field has been the host site for four OAC Baseball Tournaments and is home to the nationally-ranked Yellow Jacket baseball squad.

The "Pop" Collins Tennis complex is named in honor of former B-W tennis coach and teacher Arthur Worth Collins, the father

of nationally renowned sportswriter and television tennis analyst Arthur "Bud" Collins '51. The facility is on campus and includes six courts which are lighted for night play.

In addition, the Yellow Jacket softball team plays at the Cuyahoga County Fairgrounds Field. Last spring was the first season for the Yellow Jackets at their new field.

Does such a strong group of facilities benefit the Yellow Jacket women's basketball program? Definitely! Practice time is available in the Ursprung Gym or the fieldhouse. That means the men and women can practice at the same time without conflict. Players have a wide variety of options for preseason and post season weight and conditioning programs.

"The entire Rec Center is a plus to our program," says head coach Cheri Harrer. "The playing, practice and dress facilities are among the finest in Division III. Having a number of courts in the fieldhouse gives us the opportunity to work with a greater number of players in our varsity and junior varsity programs.

"It is one of the finest training centers of any small college in the nation," says Harrer. "We feel the Rec Center has answered the needs of the B-W community."



The student-athlete is afforded the best in equipment to use in B-W's weight and training rooms. B-W also benefits from its affiliation with the Cleveland Clinic Sports Medicine Division. A clinic doctor is at virtually every athletic event.

Applying to Baldwin-Wallace

Admission to B-W is offered on a selective basis. Each application is reviewed independently on its own merits, with careful consideration of course work, class rank, grade point averages, recommendations, test results (SAT or ACT) and extracurricular activities. To apply for admission, we encourage you to complete the application between **September** and **March** of your senior year.

A good high school preparation for B-W includes four years of English, and at least three years of math, social science and natural science, two years of foreign language, and three years of additional academic electives.

Candidates are considered as soon as all application requirements have been met, with notification usually within four to six weeks after their credentials are received.

An Exceptional Value

B-W is committed to making college affordable. In fact, your chances of receiving some form of financial assistance at B-W are excellent. Nearly two-thirds of our current students receive B-W need-based aid; and more than 90 percent receive assistance in some form.

Your first step in the financial aid process is to complete the F.A.F.S.A. (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). This should be completed no later than March 1st. After you have been admitted to B-W and the F.A.F.S.A. report has been received and processed, you will receive your award. Typically this will consist of gift assistance (need-based grant and scholarship), low interest federal loans and work study employment.

The Baldwin-Wallace College Women's Golf student-athlete is one of the best publicized in all of small college and NCAA Division III athletics. Several factors help this to happen.

Its location, its national and conference affiliation and philosophy of athletics, its administration and coaches and its support of the student-athlete all play large roles in telling others about B-W and the successes of its student-athletes.

Baldwin-Wallace College is a small, private, liberal arts college located 12 miles southwest of Cleveland, Ohio. While being in the small and progressive local community of Berea, B-W student-athletes benefit from being close to a major urban area such as Greater Cleveland/Akron. B-W athletics receive support both in Cleveland and Akron and in the Berea community itself.

Being a member of the prestigious Ohio Athletic Conference and playing NCAA Division III athletics also is an advantage. Coaches who are teachers first forge a solid commitment to the Division III philosophy of the student-athlete. Baldwin-Wallace also is proud of its athletic heritage and the fact that it has produced the third most small college CoSIDA-GTE College Division Academic All-Americans since 1984. In 1997, B-W had three Academic All-Americans, including men's basketball player Kevin Braaten (Strongsville, Ohio) '97. The year prior, men's basketball player Brian Higley '96 (Stow, Ohio) was tabbed as a first-team Academic All-American. Overall, the Yellow Jacket men's program has produced four Academic All-American student-athletes since head coach Steve Bankson took over the program.

Support in terms of facilities, equipment and transportation and in staff provides the Baldwin-Wallace student-athlete with a luxury not enjoyed at many other schools.

One part of that support is in the area of sports information. A diligent staff of B-W sport information student assistants and sport management majors work with the director to publicize B-W and its coaches and student-athletes in 20 NCAA Division III sports.

The students learn first-hand about publicizing a program by updating the internet website, writing hometown press releases and doing feature stories, doing game and cumulative statistics as well as statistical analysis, game and special event programs, recruiting brochures and media guides, contacting local, state and national media sources prior to and after each game and promoting and administering special events during athletic contests.

Each Yellow Jacket Women's Golf student-athlete receives a preseason, mid-season and postseason hometown press release which is sent to the individual student-athlete hometown newspaper. When the student-athletes fill out a preseason questionnaire, each

is asked to list his or her hometown newspaper.

After each women's golf tournament, the internet website is updated, a FAX is sent to B-W's base of local, state and national media that regularly cover or have requested B-W coverage. In addition, hometown facsimile messages about individual performances are also sent either the night of the contest or the next day.

The day following an athletic event, statistics are updated and made available to all requesting the information.

Campus radio station WBWC, 88.3 FM, broadcasts all home and away football and basketball games as well as covering all other Yellow Jacket sporting events, press conferences or announcements on a selected basis. ***All Yellow Jacket men's and women's basketball games are also broadcast over the internet website at www.bw.edu/athletics.*** A number of former B-W student broadcasters have gone to successful careers in the Greater Cleveland area, both in radio and in television. In addition, the four local commercial television stations and numerous radio stations do game coverage and feature interviews on a selected basis.

The Baldwin-Wallace College student-athlete receives excellent local small college coverage both in terms of game coverage and hometown coverage by *The Plain Dealer* (Cleveland's major daily with a circulation of more than 500,000 homes), the *Chronicle-Telegram* (based in Elyria, Ohio), the *Morning Journal* (based in Lorain, Ohio), the *Beacon-Journal* (based in Akron, Ohio), the *Medina County Gazette* (based in Medina, Ohio), the *Sun Newspapers* (Cleveland's largest weekly newspaper serving the Greater Cleveland area) and a number of other daily and weekly publications in Northeast Ohio.

Overall, the sports information office at Baldwin-Wallace College offers the student-athlete the opportunity to receive maximum exposure at the small college level. In addition to giving the Yellow Jacket student-athlete the most comprehensive coverage available at the NCAA Division III level, the B-W sports information student assistant garners solid skills in writing, communications, marketing, promotion and publication layout and design. Overall, 14 former SID student assistants have gone on to sports information careers at either the NCAA Division I and I-AA level such as the University of Texas, Arizona State University, the University of Nebraska, the University of Arkansas, the University of Florida, Monmouth (N.J.), Kent State University, Eastern Michigan University and others. Others are involved with professional teams such as the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL and the Cleveland Force of the MISL.
