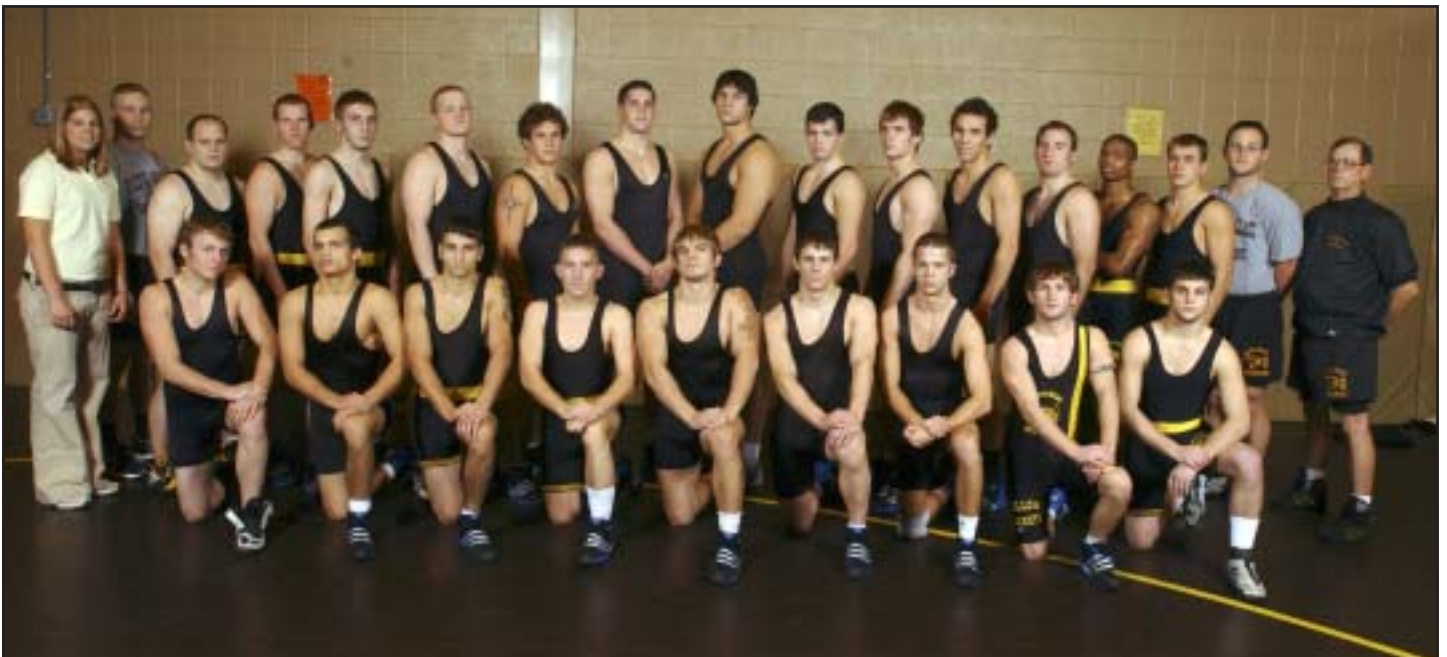

In his 17th season of coaching the wrestlers at B-W in 2004-2005, Fleming is committed to having championship wrestling at B-W and keeping the Yellow Jackets a power in the Ohio Athletic Conference and at the

Since taking over the program, Fleming has tutored 24 wrestlers to the Division III national tournament, including a national champion. In 10 of the past 11 years, his team has been nationally ranked.

As a wrestler, Fleming learned that it takes hard work to become a champion. His 123-pound Mid-American Conference title while at Miami of Ohio is evidence of that work ethic.

Fleming is a 1963 graduate of Miami of Ohio and earned his master's degree from Cleveland State University in

1985. Prior to coming to B-W he spent 18 years building a powerful program at nearby Parma Senior High School. Fleming is retired as a teacher and has dedicated his time to building the Yellow Jacket program into one of the best in Division III.

In addition, Fleming is assisted by former Yellow Jacket wrestlers and graduates Sean Folk and Max DeLuca. In addition, John Duplay will serve as a volunteer assistant coach.

Max DeLuca, Assistant Coach



W away from wrestling. He began his wrestling career as a junior in 1998-99. As a sophomore (wrestling eligibility) in 1998-99, DeLuca had an 8-5 overall record and battled injuries throughout the season. As a junior in 1999-2000, Max blossomed as one of the top 184 pounders in the OAC. He had a 22-9

Max DeLuca is beginning his fourth season as an assistant coach. He is a recent graduate from B-W in 2001. While at B-W, he spent two years on the wrestling team and played four years of football. DeLuca spent his first two years at B-

overall record and placed second at both the OAC Tournament to earn All-OAC honors. In 2000-2001, Max has a 49-26 mark for his career and a team-leading 19-12 overall record with two pins this season. Max's best showing this winter was when he placed second at the Ashland University Invitational. Max was named as the OAC Wrestler of the Week (for the Week of Feb. 5). He won the 184-pound title at the 15th Annual John Summa Invitational Tournament. In addition to wrestling, Deluca was a successful football player.

As a freshman in 1996, Max saw action at the junior varsity level at running back and earned a varsity letter as the varsity punter. Max finished third in the Ohio Athletic Conference with a 37.7 yard average per punt. As

a sophomore in 1997, Max saw action on the varsity level both as a running back and punter. At RB, Max carried the ball 20 times for 85 yards (4.3 average per carry) with a long run of 16 yards. As the punter, Max averaged 34.5 yards per punt in 49 attempts. In 1998, Max averaged 37.8 yards per punt, with a long of 54 yards. Max had his best season as a college punter in 1999. He averaged 40.0 yards per punt in 56 attempts and earned second-team All-OAC honors. His season-long punt of 58 yards was one yard off his career-high of 59 which he set as a sophomore. Max named third-team Football Gazette All-North Region and as a USAIII Division III honorable mention Special Teams All-American.

mance of his freshman season was a second place finish at the Claude Sharer Tournament hosted by Case Western Reserve University. He also placed in the top five in four other events. As a team, Folk and the Yellow Jackets finished fourth in the conference and was ranked as high as 18th in the country.

As a sophomore, Folk went 17-13 on the year before moving up to the 158 and 167-pound weight class as a junior and posted an 8-15 individual record with two pins.

During his senior season, he had a 20-14 individual record wrestling

in the 177-pound weight class. He served as a team captain and qualified for the NCAA Division III National Tournament.

Folk ended his wrestling career with two 20-win seasons and finished with a 65-61 individual record.

After graduation, he spent a year as an assistant coach before leaving the program. Folk returned to his alma mater and wrestling two years ago as an assistant coach.

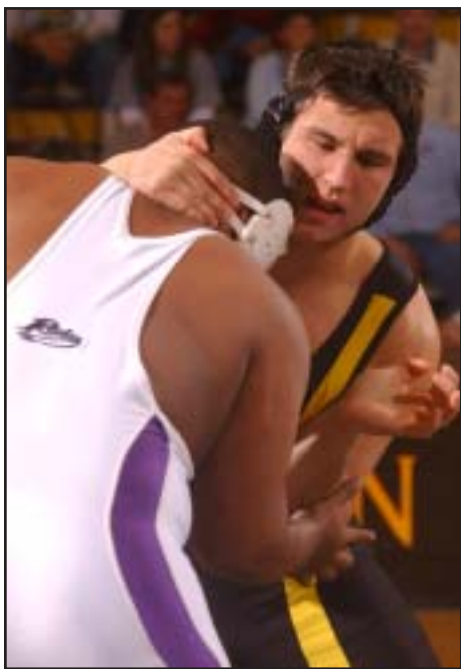
The Baldwin-Wallace College Wrestling Team Will Seek to Battle for the Ohio Athletic Conference Title in 2004-2005

BEREA, OHIO — The Baldwin-Wallace College wrestling team has high hopes that it will battle for an Ohio Athletic Conference title in 2004-2005. In order to win an OAC title, veteran Head Coach Rich Fleming knows that it will take a supreme effort from his grapplers and for some other intangibles to fall his way.

"We have some very talented young men returning to our program from last year and we had another good offseason of recruiting," said 17th-year Yellow Jacket Head Coach Rich Fleming, who was also a high school head coach for 17 years prior to his arrival at B-W. "But we will still have the same two problems that have plagued us in the past staring us right in the face.

"The two problems are injuries and depth," said Fleming, who is the second winningest wrestling coach in school history behind the legendary John Summa. "The injuries that we suffer will directly affect our depth, and sometimes at more than one weight class. To have a chance to win a conference title, we will have to be relatively injury-free."

Entering the 2004-2005 campaign, Fleming welcomes back 11 veteran grapplers, including 10 lettermen of

which four individually have competed in the OAC championship match of their respective weight class. The four include junior 197-pounder Devin Carman (Ashtabula/ Geneva High School), junior 285-pounder Bryan Kmetz (Brunswick), senior 165-pounder Joe Heiland (Shelby) and junior 141-pounder Jared Selover (Wapakoneta). Heiland and Selover each won an OAC title two years ago and also advanced to the OAC Championship match last year. Selover was a Division III All-American when he finished sixth at the NCAA Division III National Tournament in 2003.

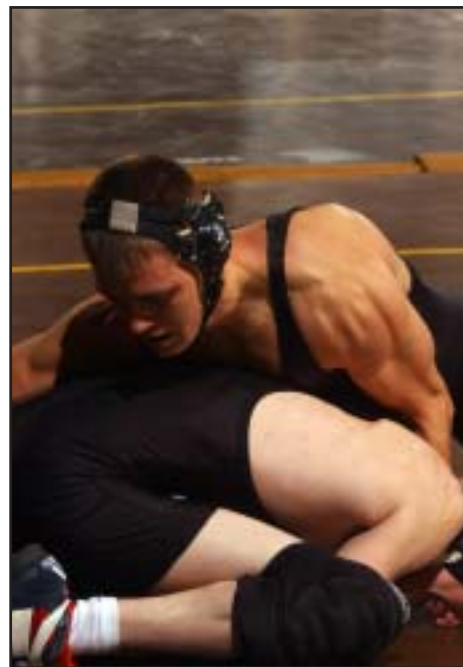
"In Devin, Bryan, Joe and Jared, we have four young men who are experienced, solid wrestlers who have the talent and ability to win an OAC individual title," said Fleming. "Each young man is a proven Division III wrestler. They give us a great base of leadership."

Carman compiled a 23-7 record as a freshman in 2002-2003 and placed second at 197 pounds OAC the OAC Tournament at B-W. He narrowly missed winning an OAC title and a trip to the national tournament. A year ago, an illness hindered his season and he finished 11-3 overall and did not compete at the OAC tourney. Carman is back this year and ready to challenge for an individual crown.

Kmetz is a junior but wrestled for the first time last year. He compiled an outstanding 28-5 overall slate and was nationally-ranked much of the year. He lost in the OAC Championship match. With a year of experience under his belt, look for Kmetz to be better and again a contender for an OAC title.

Heiland has been one of the top wrestlers in the OAC the past four years. The fifth-year senior, who has been beset by injuries a number of times in his career, is looking forward to a strong and healthy senior season. As a junior, Heiland compiled a 32-7 record and won an OAC title but was injured in his first match at the national tourney. Last year, he had an 18-6 mark but again suffered an injury at midseason but battled back to compete at the OAC tourney but lost in the 165-pound title match. Heiland enters his senior year with a 62-18 career record.

Selover will move up a weight class for the third straight year and compete at 141 pounds this year. As a freshman,

he won an OAC title at 125 pounds and finished 35-8 overall. He capped his season by placing sixth at the Division III national meet where he had a 4-2 record. Last year, Selover split time between 125 and 133 pounds and had a 22-7 combined slate and ended his season with a loss in the OAC title match at 133 pounds. This year, Selover will be at 141 pounds and would like to keep that title in B-W's possession as 2004 Yellow Jacket graduate Sayre Wuhr won that title in 2004.

In addition to his top four grapplers, Fleming returns six other lettermen, including senior 149-pounder Scott Conrath (St. Clairsville), junior 125-pounder Mike Ham (Concord Township/ Notre Dame-Cathedral Latin), junior 133-pounder Chris Harrold (Willoughby/ South), senior 184-pounder Sterling Sebek (Columbus, Ga./ Brookstone), junior 174-pounder T. Terry (Bedford/ St. Peter Chanel) and junior 157-pounder Steve Vaughn (Parma/ Normandy).

"Our other seven returning lettermen all seem to be much-improved over a year ago and we will look to them to help lead the way and provide leadership for our younger wrestlers," said Fleming. "Both as starters and as people

who will provide depth, each of the seven is an important ingredient to our success."

Of his newcomers, Fleming feels that freshman 125-pounder Brett Thomas (Gates Mills/ Mayfield), sophomore 133-pounder RayShawn Eatmon (East Cleveland/ Shaw), freshmen 157-pounders Brian Haines (Amanda/ Teays Valley) and Gino Russo (Northfield/ Nordonnia) will be the top performers.

"We have four really good newcomers," said Fleming. "And, we also have some others who may really surprise us as the season goes along. Every kid who

is in the wrestling room has talent. We hope to capitalize on that talent."

The "others" in the wrestling room who Fleming is referring to include freshman 165-pounder Jeremy Feador (North Olmsted), freshman 174-pounder Bryan Gulich (Richmond Heights), freshman 133-pounder Scott Haber (Parma/ Normandy), freshman 149-pounder Dave Hilden (Westlake), junior 285-pounder Mike Pelton (Parma/ Valley Forge), sophomore 174-pounder Patrick Rawlinson (Berea) and freshman 125-pounder John Weston (Rocky River).

"These young men are our wild-cards," said Fleming. "They are all working hard and have talent and ability to help us be a better team."

The Yellow Jackets open the 2004-2005 season on Saturday, November 13 when they travel cross-town to nonleague rival Case Western Reserve University where they will compete in a quad meet against Case, Waynesburg (Pa.) and the College of Mt. St. Joseph. The following Saturday, Nov. 20, B-W is at the Olivet (Mich.) Quad Meet.

The Ohio Athletic Conference; the third oldest conference in the nation



Entering its 102nd year, the Ohio Athletic Conference will look to continue its prominence during the 2004-05 year. In 2003-2004, the OAC was once again represented well at the national level, both academically and athletically.

During the 2003-04 season the OAC advanced 11 teams to the NCAA Division III "Sweet 16", including Wilmington College winning the National Title in women's basketball. Mount Union College finished runner-up in football and the John Carroll University men's basketball squad finished third. Three teams finished in the "Elite Eight" at the NCAA's: Ohio Northern University in volleyball, Muskingum College in softball and Wilmington in indoor track and field; and five teams ended their seasons in the "Sweet 16": Baldwin-Wallace College in football, Wilmington in women's soccer, JCU in men's soccer and wrestling and Otterbein College in men's golf. Individually, Mount Union's Eddis Singleton and Wilmington's Emily Herring both became national champions in their respective events, the 50-yard freestyle in swimming and the high jump in track and field.

Individually, the Conference was represented by 56 All-Americans, 32 men and 24 women, and 13 Academic All-Americans to go along with a bevy of regional and national honors for our student-athletes and coaches. The Conference also had an athlete earn CoSIDA Academic All-America Team Member-of-the-Year honors in her respective sport.

The OAC, the third oldest conference in college athletics, is predated only by the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (1888) and the Big Ten (1895). The Conference is older than the World Series and even the NCAA itself and has survived two world wars, the Great Depression, the Korean War and the Vietnam Conflict. From a modest beginning of six charter members in 1902, the OAC grew to as many as 24 members in the mid-1920s.

Through the years a total of 30 colleges and universities at one time or another have been members of the OAC. Currently the Conference consists of 10 members, including Baldwin-Wallace College, Capital University, Heidelberg College, John Carroll University, Marietta College, Mount Union College, Muskingum College, Ohio Northern

University, Otterbein College and Wilmington College. Wilmington became the 31st OAC member school, on July 1, 2000.

In the OAC's first year of existence, 1902, the first Conference champion was crowned. Case Tech won the football title with a 5-0-0 record. Outdoor track was added a year later and a third sport, cross country, became a Conference sport in 1914. More sports were steadily added to the OAC's repertoire throughout the years, culminating in the addition of women's sports in 1984. The Conference currently sponsors championships in 21 sports, 11 men's and 10 women's.

The enrollments at the 10 OAC institutions range from 1,200 to 4,500. All of the schools were founded in the 19th century and have long and outstanding academic reputations. While maintaining these high academic standards, Ohio Athletic Conference athletic teams and athletes have consistently enjoyed a great deal of success on a regional and national level. The athletic competition is viewed not as an end in itself, but as an extension of the educational programs.

Wrestling at Baldwin-Wallace College: A Tradition of Excellence

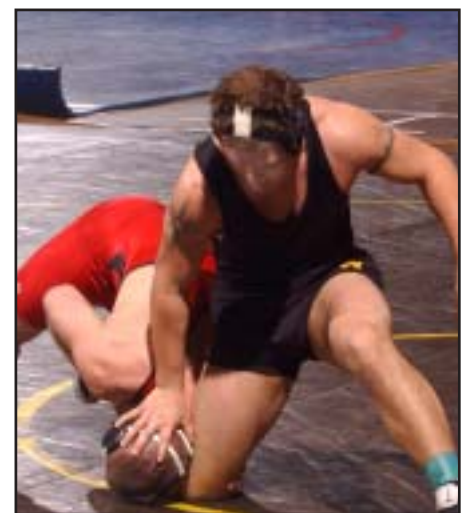
The Baldwin-Wallace College wrestling program has a rich winning tradition in the Ohio Athletic Conference and at the NCAA Division III level. B-W has been solid at the annual OAC Tournament and has sent numerous wrestlers to the NCAA Division III National Championships.

Since coming to Berea 17 years ago, Rich Fleming and his staff have produced one national champion in 177-pounder Kevin Higgins (1988-89) and four All-Americans. The All-Americans are Kelly Keenan, the 1994 national runner-up at 177 pounds; Doug Knight, who placed seventh at 134 pounds in 1994; Dan Hulten, who placed eighth at 158 pounds in 1992; and Kevin Atkins, who placed eighth at 174 pounds in 2000. Overall, 20 Yellow Jacket grapplers have advanced to the

NCAA Division III National Championships. In eight of the last 10 years, the Yellow Jacket program has been nationally ranked by the NCAA Division III Coaches Association.

"We wrestle in one of the best conferences in Division III," said Fleming. "Our wrestlers are challenged each week with outstanding competition. It has made us a good Division III program."

The Baldwin-Wallace College wrestling program strives for excellence by asking each student-athlete to be highly dedicated and place the goals of the team ahead of any personal recognition. The ultimate goal of athletics at B-W is to watch each student-athlete grow, mature and graduate at the end of his stay.

Baldwin-Wallace College Picked to Finish as Runners-Up in the 2005 OAC Championships in the Conference Coaches Polls

BEREA, OHIO - The Baldwin-Wallace College wrestling team was picked to finish as runners-up in the 2005 OAC Championships by the seven Ohio Athletic Conference coaches.

Baldwin-Wallace returns three runner-up finishers from a year ago, junior Jared Selover (Wapakoneta) at 133 pounds, senior Joe Heiland (Shelby) at 165 pounds and sophomore Brian Kmetz (Brunswick) at 285.

The John Carroll wrestling team was picked to win both the OAC dual-meet season and the 2005 OAC Championship.

John Carroll, the three-time defending OAC Tournament champions, received six of seven possible first place votes and 36 total points in both the OAC Dual Meet poll and OAC Championships poll. JCU and Ohio Northern tied for the 2004 OAC regular-season crown with identical 5-1 mark in Conference action. JCU captured its ninth overall title in 2004 since it rejoined the League in 1989-90 season. Coaches are not allowed to vote for their own team.

The Blue Streaks return three Conference champions from the 2003-04 season: senior Tim Lennox (Naperville, IL/Central) captured the 133 individual title, senior Mark Hawald (Solon) won at 174 pounds and junior heavyweight Derek Ankney (Sidney) won his weight class. Ankney and Hawald helped lead JCU to a 12th place finish at the 2004 NCAA Division III Championships. Both Ankney and Hawald earned All-America honors for the first time in their careers with a fifth and third place finish in their respective weight classes, heavyweight and 174. Ankney and Hawald became the 96th and 97th All-Americans in JCU program history.

Heidelberg was picked to finish second during the dual meet season, while Heidelberg returns sophomore Luke Spurlock (Bellevue) is back after finishing runner-up at 141 pounds last season.

Also returning to the mat after earning All-Conference honors in their respective weight classes in 2004 are Ohio Northern junior Ty Klofta (Belle

Center/Indian Lake) who won at 125 pounds, Wilmington sophomore Lance Marcus (Washington Court House) who won at 197 pounds, Quaker junior Carl Amerine (Columbus/Franklin Hts.) who was runner-up at 149 pounds and Muskingum junior Adam Justice (Romulus, MI/Woodhaven) who finished second at 184 pounds.

According to the October 22 Brute/Adidas National Wrestling Coaches Association preseason poll, John Carroll was ranked ninth and Baldwin-Wallace 25th. According to the October 22 individual rankings, Ty Klofta of ONU was ranked eighth at 125 pounds, Tim Lennox of JCU was fifth and Rocky Laughlin of MTU was sixth at 133 pounds, Dan Ralph of JCU was seventh at 149 pounds, Mark Hawald of JCU was second at 174 and Derek Ankney of JCU was fifth at 285 pounds.

The 2005 OAC Wrestling Championships will be held on Saturday, February 26 at Wilmington College in Wilmington.

The 150,000 square foot Rec Center serves as home for the health and physical education departments, all winter intercollegiate and intramural sports, as well as playing host for a number of amateur sporting events.

The Rec Center, which includes the Rudolph S. Ursprung Gymnasium, serves as the home of Yellow Jackets basketball,

volleyball and wrestling teams. Ursprung Gymnasium, which has housed B-W basketball since 1949, received a complete renovation in 1986. In addition to B-W playing in the Ursprung Gym, the Ohio High School Athletic Association has long

courts that can be used individually or in tandem for volleyball, basketball, tennis and other activities. On many occasions, the B-W basketball team has been playing a game while a wrestling match or an intramural basketball game was taking place in

used the B-W facility for its sectional and district tournaments for boys.

The fieldhouse consists of a 200-meter, six-lane track that is named for 1949 B-W graduate and four-time Olympic gold medalist Harrison Dillard. The track, with its Mondo surface, is both fast and comfortable for the walker, jogger or serious runner. Pits for the field events are also incorporated. The track surrounds three multi-purpose

the Rec Center fieldhouse.

The Harrison Dillard Track, along with the multi-purpose courts, have been home for the B-W indoor track teams, the John Summa Invitational Wrestling Tournament, the Ohio Sports Festival (basketball and wrestling venues) and many local high school track meets.

Also in the Rec Center is the B-W Natatorium, home to the Yellow Jacket

It seats 8,100 fans comfortably.

swimming and diving teams. The facility includes a 25-yard, six-lane pool with a one-meter diving board. The movable pool bottom has adaptive physical therapy applications and can be used by the disabled.

As part of the renovation of Ursprung, chairback seating and a new media center were constructed while training and physical therapy, laundry and eight locker rooms were added. Other features include a room for news media as well as exhibit and storage areas for the B-W Athletic Archives. The Archives give students, alumni, parents, friends and visitors to Baldwin-Wallace a glimpse of the rich tradition and heritage of Yellow Jacket teams and athletic greats.

The Finnie Stadium (pictured above) is one of the nations best small college stadiums for football and track and field. The Yellow Jacket men's and women's soccer teams also play at Finnie.

B-W has already hosted three NCAA Division III national championship track meets, numerous NCAA and Ohio High School Athletic Association football play-off games as well as being the home field to both Berea High School and Middleburg Heights Midpark High School. The Ohio Sports Festival/Ohio State Games also uses Finnie as both a regional and state championship site.

The B-W Baseball Field is located on the campus within walking distance of the

student dormitories. The facility has a manicured playing surface and seating for approximately 200 fans. The B-W Baseball Field has been the host site for four OAC Baseball Tournaments and is home to the nationally-ranked Yellow Jacket baseball squad.

The "Pop" Collins Tennis complex is named in honor of former B-W tennis coach

and teacher Arthur Worth Collins, the father of nationally renowned sportswriter and television tennis analyst Arthur "Bud" Collins '51. The facility is on campus and includes six courts which are lighted for night play.

In addition, the Yellow Jacket softball team plays at the Cuyahoga County Fairgrounds Field. Last spring was the first season for the Yellow Jackets at their new field.

Does such a strong group of facilities benefit the Yellow Jacket women's basketball program? Definitely! Practice time is available in the Ursprung Gym or the fieldhouse. That means the men and women can practice at the same time without conflict. Players have a wide variety of options for preseason and post season weight and conditioning programs.

"The entire Rec Center is a plus to our program," says head coach Cheri Harrer. "The playing, practice and dress facilities are among the finest in Division III. Having a number of courts in the fieldhouse gives us the opportunity to work with a greater number of players in our varsity and junior varsity programs.

"It is one of the finest training centers of any small college in the nation," says Harrer. "We feel the Rec Center has answered the needs of the B-W community."



The student-athlete is afforded the best in equipment to use in B-W's weight and training rooms. B-W also benefits from its affiliation with the Cleveland Clinic Sports Medicine Division. A clinic doctor is at virtually every athletic event.

Yellow Jacket Sophomore Bryan Kmetz is One of the Top 285-Pounders in Division III

BEREA, OHIO -- Baldwin-Wallace College sophomore 285-pound wrestler Bryan Kmetz, a graduate of Brunswick High School and former Ohio High School Athletic Association state qualifier, thought he'd strapped on his headgear for the last time his senior year of high school.

Kmetz left Brunswick and headed to B-W with no intentions of wrestling. After spending his freshman year at B-W as a spectator, he decided to make a move back to the mat.

"Honestly, I just missed it," said Kmetz. "My real decision to come back into wrestling was because I've been doing it since first grade. When you compete for so long, you really don't appreciate it enough until you are away from it. Not wrestling two tears ago may have been the best thing for me."

One person who is pleased that Kmetz has returned is veteran Yellow Jacket Head Coach Rich Fleming, who has been a head coach for 34 years, 16 at B-W and 18 at Parma Senior High School. "Bryan is a first-class young man and an outstanding wrestler.

"We were hoping that Bryan would wrestle as a freshman but he wanted to make sure he had his feet firmly set in his academics before even thinking about wrestling, and that was fine," said Fleming. "When he finally decided to compete, we knew we had a good one." Good doesn't totally describe what Kmetz had done in his first year at the collegiate level. He led B-W in victories with 28 and finished 28-5 overall with an .848 winning percentage.

Kmetz admits there were challenges getting back into the sport.

"When I started practicing again, I was used to working out so there wasn't much physical agony," said Kmetz, a fitness management major. "But the mental strain of wrestling can be rough. The combination of practices and tournaments does take away from time for schoolwork. However, the satisfaction I get from wrestling outweighs the negatives."

One major positive of Kmetz's decision was his contribution to the B-W team. With the graduation of Greg Hartlaub in 2003, Kmetz's comeback filled a large void in the Yellow Jacket roster. Hartlaub, the 2003 Ohio Athletic Conference heavyweight champion and NCAA national qualifier, was a four-

year starter.

What began as Kmetz's desire to return to competition, has quickly evolved into championship performances by a first-year starter. Kmetz went 4-0 to claim the heavyweight title at the Rochester Institute of Technology Tournament on December 6, 2003 in Rochester New York. In the championship match, Kmetz defeated cross-town rival Derek Ankney of John Carroll with a score of 8-6.

"So far my best moment has been winning the RIT tournament," said Kmetz. "It was my first college tournament and I never expected to do that well."

In addition, Kmetz fared well at last season's Division III National Dual Match Championships at Lycoming College in Williamsport Pennsylvania. At the National Duals, he compiled a 3-0 record and helped the Yellow Jackets win one of their four matches.

"Bryan wrestled well at the National Duals," said Fleming. "We had a relatively young team (two seniors among the 22 team members), and Bryan was one of a number of talented young members of the team a year ago. He continues to dominate Division III competition and has solidified our lineup."

Having Kmetz at 285 pounds was a key to B-W finishing the 2003-2004 season 6-7 overall and 3-3 in the Ohio Athletic Conference.

"In 2002-2003, we had an outstanding heavyweight (285-pounder) in Greg Hartlaub of Avon Lake," said Fleming. "Greg won the OAC title and advanced to the Division III National Tournament. When he graduated, we needed someone of quality to fill that void. Bryan has certainly filled that void and more."

Kmetz feels that because wrestling is an individual sport, it has helped him. He wants to be in control of his own destiny. By working individually and independently, he is in control of how well he can do as well as his ability to help his team.

"I like wrestling because I know that when I win a match, it's because of me and the work I put in," said Kmetz. "I alone won the match, but I'm helping the team too. The same goes for losing, it's my fault, but I'm also affecting the team as a whole."

Fleming also feels that the individu-

ality of the sport helps a person like Kmetz.

"Bryan is very self-motivated," said Fleming. "He works extremely hard and he is his biggest critic. Bryan is constantly seeking ways to get better and works hard to make changes that will make him better. He puts forth the effort that leads to winning championships. We have been very proud of Bryan, both the way he has wrestled and by the way he has helped to lead by example."

Kmetz added, "Winning keeps me motivated. The thought of wrestling at nationals is a great motivator as well. It would be the greatest thing for our team to make an impact at the national tournament."

"Bryan will have a definite shot at getting to the nationals in the upcoming season," said Fleming. "In the OAC, you must win your weight class to qualify, and Bryan has shown that he is one of the top 285-pounders in the OAC."

"Bryan knows that his opportunity to compete at the national tournament," said Fleming. "He has the talent and ability."

"Without a doubt, my biggest role model has been my dad," said Kmetz. "He wasn't a wrestler but his work ethic has influenced me to go 110 percent all the time and in doing whatever I am doing. He taught me that you get out of something what you put into it."

"I want to also thank my dad and my family for coming to all my matches, every year, no matter the location," continued Kmetz. "My family came to RIT and to Lycoming and Elmhurst. That support makes a big difference."

With such a successful season as a first-year grappler, Kmetz remains focused on the three seasons ahead of him.

"During the off-season, I plan on lifting, putting on as many lbs. as possible and coming back bigger and stronger in 2004-2005," said Kmetz.

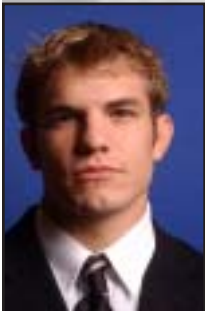

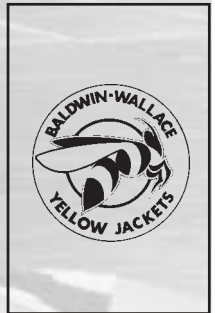

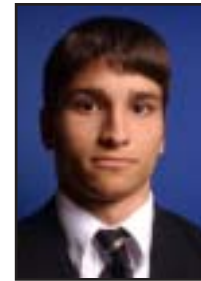

Baldwin-Wallace Wrestling Coach Rich Fleming Wins His 100th Career Match

BEREA, OHIO -- Baldwin-Wallace College wrestling coach Rich Fleming is one of the good guys. He wears a white hat and everyone likes him. On Tuesday, January 20, 2003 in Wilmington, Ohio and at Ohio Athletic Conference rival Wilmington College, Fleming won his 100th career match as the mentor of the Yellow Jacket program.

"It was an outstanding achievement for Coach," said Yellow Jacket assistant coach and former B-W football all-american and All-OAC wrestler Max DeLuca. "Coach has meant so much to me.

"It isn't so much the wins that make Coach such a great influence," said DeLuca, in his third year as an assistant at his alma mater. "It is his dedication and commitment to the program, to the wrestlers, to the coach and most importantly his family. I have looked up to Coach Fleming since the day I got to B-W and that continues today. He is just a great role model.

"In terms of coaching wrestling, Coach Fleming has seen almost everything and knows the sport from top-to-bottom," said DeLuca. "I speak for many, many wrestlers who have competed at B-W and for Coach Fleming when I say congratulations on your

100th win, and thanks for making a difference in our lives."

In his 16th season of coaching the wrestlers at B-W in 2003-2004 and in his 35th year overall as a head coach, Fleming is committed to having championship wrestling at the College and keeping the Yellow Jackets a power in the OAC and at the NCAA Division III level. Two years ago, Fleming's Yellow Jackets were second at the rugged OAC Tournament.

Since taking over the program, Fleming has tutored 24 wrestlers to the Division III national tournament, including a national champion. A year ago, three of Fleming's grapplers won OAC individual titles and advanced to the NCAA Division III National Tournament. In 11 of the past 12 years, his team has been nationally ranked, including this year.

As a wrestler, Fleming learned that it takes hard work to become a champion. His 123-pound Mid-American Conference title while at Miami of Ohio is evidence of that work ethic.

Fleming is a 1963 graduate of Miami of Ohio and earned his master's degree from Cleveland State University in 1985. Prior to coming to B-W, he spent 18 years

building a powerful program at nearby Parma Senior High School. Fleming is retired as a teacher.

Admission to B-W is offered on a selective basis. Each application is reviewed independently on its own merits, with careful consideration of course work, class rank, grade point averages, recommendations, test results (SAT or ACT) and extracurricular activities. The Baldwin-Wallace College wrestling student-athlete is one of the best publicized in all of small college and NCAA Division III athletics. Several factors help this to happen.

Its location, its national and conference affiliation and philosophy of athletics, its administration and coaches and its support of the student-athlete all play large roles in telling others about B-W and the successes of its student-athletes.

Baldwin-Wallace College is a small, private, liberal arts college located 12 miles southwest of Cleveland, Ohio. While being in the small and progressive local community of Berea, B-W student-athletes benefit from being close to a major urban area such as Greater Cleveland/Akron. B-W athletics receive support both in Cleveland and Akron and in the Berea community itself.

Being a member of the prestigious Ohio Athletic Conference and playing NCAA Division III athletics also is an advantage. Coaches who are teachers first forge a solid commitment to the Division III philosophy of the student-athlete. Baldwin-Wallace also is proud of its athletic heritage and the fact that it has produced 54 College Division Academic All-Americans since 1972. A year ago, B-W had two Academic All-Americans: football student-athlete Joe Harbour (Upper Sandusky, Ohio) and softball student-athlete Nicole Loudin (Sheffield Lake, Ohio).

"We feel that athletics participation is a part of the educational experience of our student-athletes, not apart from it," said Baldwin-Wallace College President Mark H. Collier.

"We are extremely proud of the success of our athletics programs and our student-athletes."

In 2003, Matt Kish, a football student-athlete attained the highest grade point average in the senior class and was awarded the Milton T. Baldwin Prize at graduation.

Support in terms of facilities, equipment and transportation and in staff provides the Baldwin-Wallace student-athlete with a luxury not enjoyed at many other schools.

One part of that support is in the area of sports information. A diligent staff of B-W sport information student assistants and sport management majors work with the director to publicize B-W and its coaches and student-athletes in 20 NCAA Division III sports.

The students learn first-hand about publicizing a

program by updating the internet website, writing hometown press releases and doing feature stories, doing game and cumulative statistics as well as statistical analysis, game and special event programs, recruiting brochures and media guides, contacting local, state and national media sources prior to and after each game and promoting and administering special events during athletic contests.

Each Yellow Jacket wrestling student-athlete receives a preseason, mid-season and postseason hometown press release which is sent to the individual student-athlete hometown newspaper. When the student-athletes fill out a preseason questionnaire, each is asked to list his or her hometown newspaper.

After each wrestling meet, the internet website is updated, a FAX is sent to B-W's base of local, state and national media that regularly cover or have requested B-W coverage. In addition, hometown facsimile messages about individual performances are also sent either the night of the contest or the next day.

The day following an athletic event, statistics are updated and made available to all requesting the information.

Campus radio station WBWC, 88.3 FM, broadcasts all home and away football and basketball games as well as covering all other Yellow Jacket sporting events, press conferences or announcements on a selected basis. ***All Yellow Jacket men's and women's basketball games are also broadcast over the internet website at www.bw.edu/athletics.*** A number of former B-W student broadcasters have gone to successful careers in the Greater Cleveland area, both in radio and in television. In addition, the four local commercial television stations and numerous radio stations do game coverage and feature interviews on a selected basis.

The Baldwin-Wallace College student-athlete receives excellent local small college coverage both in terms of game coverage and hometown coverage by *The Plain Dealer* (Cleveland's major daily with a circulation of more than 500,000 homes), the *Chronicle-Telegram* (based in Elyria, Ohio), the *Morning Journal* (based in Lorain, Ohio), the *Beacon-Journal* (based in Akron, Ohio), the *Medina County Gazette* (based in Medina, Ohio), the *Sun Newspapers* (Cleveland's largest weekly newspaper serving the Greater Cleveland area) and a number of other daily and weekly publications in Northeast Ohio.

Overall, the sports information office at Baldwin-Wallace College offers the student-athlete the opportunity to receive maximum exposure at the small college level. In addition to giving the Yellow Jacket student-athlete the most comprehensive coverage available at the NCAA Division III level, the B-W sports information student assistant garners solid skills in writing, communications, marketing, promotion and publication layout and design. Overall, 14 former SID student assistants have gone on to sports information careers at either the NCAA Division I and I-AA level such as the University of Texas, Arizona State University, the University of Nebraska, the University of Arkansas, the University of Florida, Monmouth (N.J.), Kent State University, Eastern Michigan University and others. Others are involved with professional teams such as the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL and the Cleveland Force of the MISL.
