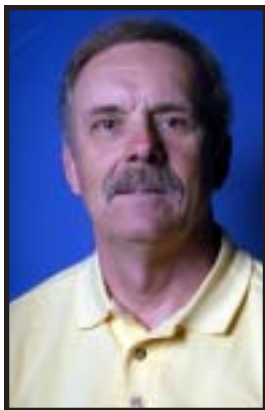

In 2004, **Isaac** had an outstanding season and finished with a 19-1 overall record and became the first B-W female tennis player to ever receive the OAC *Player of the Year* award. She set a Yellow Jacket freshman record for wins with 19 and set a school single-season record for winning percentage at .950 overall.

**Drew** had a 5-17 record in singles competition and an 1-1 doubles record last season. She will again play a pivotal role in 2004-2005 for the Yellow Jackets as they look to return to the OAC Tournament and a possible conference championship.

## Head Coach Jack Bethlenfalvy



Jack Bethlenfalvy will begin his 18th year of coaching women's tennis in 2005 and teaching health and physical education service/activity classes at Baldwin-Wallace College.

Bethlenfalvy was also the 1999 Ohio Athletic Conference Women's Tennis Coach of the Year.

Bethlenfalvy is a teacher and student of the game of tennis. His wealth of knowledge and experience, both as a player and current professional instructor, gives the B-W tennis athlete an added

bonus. In addition, Bethlenfalvy makes the game of tennis both fun and challenging.

During his 16 years at B-W, Bethlenfalvy is the winningest women's tennis coach at the College with 159 victories. Overall, Bethlenfalvy is 159-114, and his teams have had 14 winning seasons, including seven straight. He led the Yellow Jackets to the 1999 OAC title -- B-W's first-ever in women's tennis.

As a coach, Bethlenfalvy teaches the B-W women the fundamentals and competitive tennis strategy. The emphasis is on helping each player grow to her fullest potential. Knowledge of the game and sportsmanship are high priorities with the head coach.

Bethlenfalvy is a 1968 graduate of Kent State University. Prior to coming to B-W, Bethlenfalvy built a successful high school program at Parma Senior High School (1968-74).

While at Kent State University, Bethlenfalvy was a captain, the team's Most Valuable Player and a Mid-American Conference champion. Following his career at KSU, Bethlenfalvy was a ranked doubles player in Northeast Ohio.

Bethlenfalvy has been a member of the United States Professional Tennis Association and the United States Tennis Association (Pro I) since 1974. He also is a 1975 graduate of the Tennis Institute in New York City. Bethlenfalvy was the head professional at Big Creek Racquet Club from 1974-77 and at the River Run Racket Club in Strongsville from 1977 until 1999.

Bethlenfalvy resides in Parma, Ohio with his wife Sandy and two children. His son Brian is a member of the Yellow Jacket men's tennis team.

## The Baldwin-Wallace College Women Set an Ohio Athletic Conference Record With its Sixth Straight All-Sports Championship



BEREA, OHIO - - The Baldwin-Wallace College women captured an Ohio Athletic Conference record sixth straight All-Sports Championship in 2003-2004. The Yellow Jacket men finished third in the 10-school OAC.

The women totalled 57.99 points to edge second place Otterbein (57.25) by 0.74 points. The Yellow Jacket men had 62.25 points and trailed the champion by 5.75 points.

The Yellow Jacket women broke their own OAC record of five straight OAC All-Sports titles which they had done twice. The mark was originally set from 1991-92 through 1995-96 and then tied prior to this year with titles beginning in 1998-99 to the present.

Helping the women's cause were OAC titles by the volleyball team (regular season) and women's basketball team (regular season) and

second place finishes by the swim teams (regular season and OAC Championships) and softball squad (regular season).

The men's third place showing was bolstered by an OAC tennis title and second place finishes by the men's basketball team (regular season) and football.

# The Facilities at Baldwin-Wallace College Are Among

The Baldwin-Wallace College student is afforded the opportunity to learn, exercise, practice and play in some of the finest facilities in small college athletics. In addition, as a student at B-W, each has an opportunity to use a group of facilities that are unparalleled in Division III athletics.

The Recreation Center with the Ursprung Gymnasium, Harrison Dillard Track and Natatorium, The George Finnie Stadium, the B-W Baseball Field, the "Pop" Collins Tennis Complex and other outdoor recreation and athletic areas at Baldwin-Wallace make the Yellow Jackets physical plant second to none among small colleges.

The Baldwin-Wallace College Recreation Center, dedicated on October 18, 1986, is a facility that benefits all B-W students, faculty, staff and alumni and is considered one of the top recreation facilities in the country.

The 150,000 square foot Rec Center serves as home for the health and physical education departments, all winter intercollegiate and intramural sports, as well as playing host for a number of amateur sporting events.

The Rec Center, which includes the Rudolph S. Ursprung Gymnasium, serves as the home of Yellow Jackets basketball,

volleyball and wrestling teams. Ursprung Gymnasium, which has housed B-W basketball since 1949, received a complete renovation in 1986. In addition to B-W playing in the Ursprung Gym, the Ohio High School Athletic Association has long

courts that can be used individually or in tandem for volleyball, basketball, tennis and other activities. On many occasions, the B-W basketball team has been playing a game while a wrestling match or an intramural basketball game was taking place in

used the B-W facility for its sectional and district tournaments for boys.

The fieldhouse consists of a 200-meter, six-lane track that is named for 1949 B-W graduate and four-time Olympic gold medalist Harrison Dillard. The track, with its Mondo surface, is both fast and comfortable for the walker, jogger or serious runner. Pits for the field events are also incorporated. The track surrounds three multi-purpose

the Rec Center fieldhouse.

The Harrison Dillard Track, along with the multi-purpose courts, have been home for the B-W indoor track teams, the John Summa Invitational Wrestling Tournament, the Ohio Sports Festival (basketball and wrestling venues) and many local high school track meets.

Also in the Rec Center is the B-W Natatorium, home to the Yellow Jacket

swimming and diving teams. The facility includes a 25-yard, six-lane pool with a one-meter diving board. The movable pool bottom has adaptive physical therapy applications and can be used by the disabled.

As part of the renovation of Ursprung, chairback seating and a new media center were constructed while training and physical therapy, laundry and eight locker rooms were added. Other features include a room for news media as well as exhibit and storage areas for the B-W Athletic Archives. The Archives give students, alumni, parents, friends and visitors to Baldwin-Wallace a glimpse of the rich tradition and heritage of Yellow Jacket teams and athletic greats.

The Finnie Stadium (pictured above) is one of the nations best small college stadiums for football and track and field. The Yellow Jacket men's and women's soccer teams also play at Finnie.

B-W has already hosted three NCAA Division III national championship track meets, numerous NCAA and Ohio High School Athletic Association football play-off games as well as being the home field to both Berea High School and Middleburg Heights Midpark High School. The Ohio Sports Festival/Ohio State Games also uses Finnie as both a regional and state championship site.

The B-W Baseball Field is located on the campus within walking distance of the

student dormitories. The facility has a manicured playing surface and seating for approximately 200 fans. The B-W Baseball Field has been the host site for four OAC Baseball Tournaments and is home to the nationally-ranked Yellow Jacket baseball squad.

The "Pop" Collins Tennis complex is named in honor of former B-W tennis coach

and teacher Arthur Worth Collins, the father of nationally renowned sportswriter and television tennis analyst Arthur "Bud" Collins '51. The facility is on campus and includes six courts which are lighted for night play.

In addition, the Yellow Jacket softball team plays at the Cuyahoga County Fairgrounds Field. Last spring was the first season for the Yellow Jackets at their new field.

Does such a strong group of facilities benefit the Yellow Jacket women's basketball program? Definitely! Practice time is available in the Ursprung Gym or the fieldhouse. That means the men and women can practice at the same time without conflict. Players have a wide variety of options for preseason and post season weight and conditioning programs.

"The entire Rec Center is a plus to our program," says head coach Cheri Harrer. "The playing, practice and dress facilities are among the finest in Division III. Having a number of courts in the fieldhouse gives us the opportunity to work with a greater number of players in our varsity and junior varsity programs.

"It is one of the finest training centers of any small college in the nation," says Harrer. "We feel the Rec Center has answered the needs of the B-W community."

# The Ohio Athletic Conference; the third oldest conference in the nation



**TWINSBURG, OHIO** -- Entering its 102nd year, the Ohio Athletic Conference will look to continue its prominence during the 2004-05 year. In 2003-2004, the OAC was once again represented well at the national level, both academically and athletically.

During the 2003-04 season the OAC advanced 11 teams to the NCAA Division III "Sweet 16", including Wilmington College winning the National Title in women's basketball. Mount Union College finished runner-up in football and the John Carroll University men's basketball squad finished third. Three teams finished in the "Elite Eight" at the NCAA's: Ohio Northern University in volleyball, Muskingum College in softball and Wilmington in indoor track and field; and five teams ended their seasons in the "Sweet 16": Baldwin-Wallace College in football, Wilmington in women's soccer, JCU in men's soccer and wrestling and Otterbein College in men's golf. Individually, Mount Union's Eddis Singleton and Wilmington's Emily Herring both became national champions in their respective events, the 50-yard freestyle in swimming and the high jump in track and field.

Individually, the Conference was represented by 56 All-Americans, 32 men and 24 women, and 13 Academic All-Americans to go along with a bevy of regional and national honors for our student-athletes and coaches. The Conference also had an athlete earn CoSIDA Academic All-America Team Member-of-the-Year honors in her respective sport.

The OAC, the third oldest conference in college athletics, is predated only by the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association (1888) and the Big Ten (1895). The Conference is older than the World Series and even the NCAA itself and has survived two world wars, the Great Depression, the Korean War and the Vietnam Conflict. From a modest beginning of six charter members in 1902, the OAC grew to as many as 24 members in the mid-1920s.

Through the years a total of 30 colleges and universities at one time or another have been members of the OAC. Currently the Conference consists of 10 members, including Baldwin-Wallace College, Capital University, Heidelberg College, John Carroll University, Marietta College, Mount Union College, Muskingum College, Ohio Northern

University, Otterbein College and Wilmington College. Wilmington became the 31st OAC member school, on July 1, 2000.

In the OAC's first year of existence, 1902, the first Conference champion was crowned. Case Tech won the football title with a 5-0-0 record. Outdoor track was added a year later and a third sport, cross country, became a Conference sport in 1914. More sports were steadily added to the OAC's repertoire throughout the years, culminating in the addition of women's sports in 1984. The Conference currently sponsors championships in 21 sports, 11 men's and 10 women's.

The enrollments at the 10 OAC institutions range from 1,200 to 4,500. All of the schools were founded in the 19th century and have long and outstanding academic reputations. While maintaining these high academic standards, Ohio Athletic Conference athletic teams and athletes have consistently enjoyed a great deal of success on a regional and national level. The athletic competition is viewed not as an end in itself, but as an extension of the educational programs.

# Ten Yellow Jacket Student-Athletes Named to the Academic All-Ohio Athletic Conference At-Large Teams

BEREA, OHIO -- Ten Baldwin-Wallace College student-athletes have been named to the Academic All-Ohio Athletic Conference At-Large teams, recognizing each for their performances in the classroom and on the field of play.

To be eligible for Academic All-OAC accolades, a student-athlete must have at least a 3.25 cumulative grade point average, be a starter or key reserve and be in at least his/her second year of participation in the sport. Four Yellow Jackets were named to the men's Academic All-OAC At-Large team. They were senior swimmers Chris Clukey (Terrace Park/ Cincinnati Mariemont) and Scott Roberts (Sandusky/ Perkins) and junior men's tennis standout Ward Crane (Hudson/ Western Reserve Academy). In addition, junior men's tennis player Matt Seitz (Olmsted Falls) was selected honorable mention Academic All-OAC.

Clukey, a psychology major, finished his collegiate career with a 3.67 GPA and competed in the freestyle, butterfly and breaststroke events. He is eighth in school history in the 50-yard free (22.75 seconds), fifth in the 100-yard butterfly (55.97 seconds) and sixth in the 100-yard breaststroke (1:03.50). This is the second time that Clukey has been an Academic All-OAC selection.

Roberts, a history major, is a member of both the swim and track and field teams and has also run cross country. He finished with a 3.35 GPA and competed in the butterfly and individual medley events. As a senior, Roberts was an

All-OAC award winner in the 200 IM (2:02.63), 400-meter relay (3:37.15), 200-meter medley relay (1:39.14) and was the OAC champion in the 100-yard butterfly (52.74 seconds) and in the 200-yard butterfly (2:01.14). This is his first selection to the men's At-Large Academic All-OAC team as a swimmer. Roberts is also an Academic All-OAC team member in track and cross country.

Crane carries a 3.64 GPA in business administration and finance, and is a member of the men's tennis team that finished a perfect 22-0 and were OAC regular season and OAC Tournament

champions. The Yellow Jackets became the first team in OAC history to finish a season undefeated. Crane has a 44-13 career mark as a No. 1 and No. 2 singles player and has a 19-2 overall slate at No.2 this year. He is also a three-time first-team All-OAC award recipient. Crane was also a first-team Academic All-OAC selection in 2003.

Seitz, a business administration major, carries a 3.88 GPA and is also a member of the men's tennis team. He finished his junior season with a perfect 2-0 individual record in singles play as a backup for the third straight season. Seitz has a perfect 17-0 career mark. This is his first selection as Academic All-OAC.

On the women's side, senior women's tennis player Sarah Juzwik (Ashland/ Senior), senior swimmers Teri Miller (Dublin/ Coffman) and Marynda Yocum (Canal Winchester/ Pickerington) and junior swimmer Kristen Showalter (Bowling Green) were named Academic All-OAC At-Large. In addition, senior swimmer Carey McDermott (Salem/ Senior) and junior swimmer Lisa Fox (Copley) were both selected honorable mention Academic All-OAC.

Juzwik, a conservatory of music major, had a 3.72 GPA and rotated between the No.1 and No. 2 singles positions during her two-year varsity career. She posted an 8-11 singles record this spring and was 12-6 as part of the No.1 doubles team. Juzwik, who had a 12-6 singles mark at No.1 as a sophomore, was a first-team All-OAC selection in 2002. This is her first time being selected Academic All-OAC.

Miller, Showalter, Yocum, Fox and McDermott are all members of the B-W swim team.

Miller, a business administration and accounting major, has a 3.78 GPA and competed in the distance freestyle events. Miller had season best times in the 1,000 -yard freestyle (11:59.78), 1,650-yard freestyle (20:00.20), 400-yard individual medley (5:05.42), and the 500-yard freestyle (5:50.68). In B-W swimming and diving history, Miller ranks 10th in the 1000-yard free (11:54.61), seventh in the 1650-yard free (19:58.38), fourth in the 400-yard IM (5:022.42) and eighth in the 200-yard breaststroke (2:42.45). This is her first selection to the At-Large Academic

All-OAC team.

Showalter is an early childhood education major who carries a 3.39 GPA and competes in the butterfly and middle distance and distance freestyle events. Showalter is an 18-time All-OAC award winner and seven-time OAC Individual champion. She currently holds three individual school records (200 free, 500 free and 1000 free) and is a member of two record-setting relay teams (400-yard medley and 400-yard free relay).

Yocum, a psychology major who graduated with a 3.59 GPA, competed in the backstroke and freestyle events. She is a seven-time All-OAC award winner and holds the school record in the 100-yard backstroke and is a member of two

record-setting relay teams (400 medley relay and 200 free relay). As a junior in 2003, Yocum was the OAC champ in the 100-yard backstroke. She is also a member of the B-W cross country team.

McDermott, an early childhood major, had a 3.32 GPA and graduated a year early (in three years). She competed in the breaststroke and individual medley events. She is a four-time All-OAC award recipient and owns school records in the 100 and 200-yard breaststroke events. McDermott is also a member of school record-setting relay teams in the 200-yard medley relay and the 400 medley relay. In addition to excelling in the pool, McDermott served as the Sports Editor of the student newspaper, *The Exponent*, for two years.

Fox, a mathematics and business administration major, carries a 3.47 GPA and also competes in the backstroke and IM events. She is a five-time All-OAC award recipient and was the OAC Champion in the 100-yard backstroke and a member of the school record setting 200-yard medley relay team in 2003-2004.

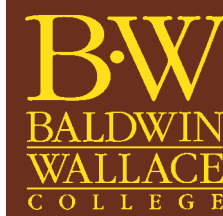

# Baldwin-Wallace College Tennis Players Wagner and Isaac are OAC Players of the Year; Rector is OAC Men's Coach of the Year

**BEREA, OHIO** -- Baldwin-Wallace College junior men's tennis player Mike Wagner (Avon Lake) and freshman women's player Andrea Isaac (New Philadelphia) are this year's Ohio Athletic Conference Men's and Women's Tennis Players of the Year and Brian Rector is this year's OAC Men's Tennis Coach of the Year.

Wagner led the Yellow Jackets men's team to its first OAC title since 1992 as B-W finished a perfect 22-0 overall, 9-0 during the OAC regular season and shut out all three opponents at last weekend's OAC Tournament. Individually, Wagner was 19-1 overall in 2003-2004 with his only loss coming in the fall at the ITA (Intercollegiate Tennis Association) Regional Tournament. This spring, Wagner was a perfect 18-0 in singles play, including a 17-0 mark as B-W's number one player. To illustrate Wagner's dominance this spring, he did not lose a set (36-0). In addition, Wagner and his

number one doubles partner, Ward Crane (Hudson/ Western Reserve Academy) were also 14-4. Wagner, a three-time first-team All-OAC selection by the OAC Coaches, is 53-6 in three seasons in the Brown & Gold. His season also may not be over as he is awaiting word from the NCAA Division III Selection Committee in the next 10 days regarding an individual spot in this year's NCAA Division III National Tournament. Wagner is just the second B-W player in school history to be named as the OAC Men's Player of the

Year.

Isaac burst onto the scene this year and compiled a 19-1 individual mark as the Yellow Jacket women's No.1 singles standout. She began the season playing No.2 singles but moved into the No.1 position early into the spring campaign and was a perfect 8-0 against OAC competition. Isaac is the first freshman to be named as the OAC Women's Player of the Year. Her 19 victories set a B-W freshman record and was one shy of the all-time school mark of 20.

Rector was named as the Coach of the Year for the first time in his 15-year career. The OAC title this spring also marked his second during Rector's tenure. In 15 years, Rector has a 243-57 career mark. In the past two years, Rector's Yellow Jackets are 42-4 overall. Rector is a 1989 B-W graduate and a former Academic All-America player.

## 19-Year Veteran Jack Bethlenfalvy Wins 200th Career Match at Baldwin-Wallace College as its Women's Tennis Coach

BEREA, OHIO — In a society that is so focused on winning, it is rare to find coaches who lead an athletic program for long periods of time without jumping from job to job to job. That is why the Baldwin-Wallace College women's tennis team has been fortunate to have a great coach who has experienced success and has no intention of leaving Berea for a bigger program

For 19 years, Yellow Jacket Head Coach Jack Bethlenfalvy has led the Yellow Jackets to 16 winning seasons and the 1999 Ohio Athletic Conference Championship. On Monday, April 4, Bethlenfalvy won the 200th career match at B-W when his squad defeated Cleveland cross-town rival Case Western Reserve University, 8-1, in University Circle.

"Jack Bethlenfalvy is always a very

upbeat person who loves the game of tennis, loves to teach the game of tennis and is a great mentor to the women who play tennis at Baldwin-Wallace College," said B-W Women's Athletic Director Cheri Harrer.

Harrer ought to know how Bethlenfalvy feels. She has won more than 300 games as B-W's women's basketball coach the past 15 years.

"Jack is a very grounded person who loves B-W," said Harrer. "Jack has been on the west side of Cleveland for many years. We are very lucky to have him at B-W and hope he remains here as an instructor, our tennis coach and a facility manager until he decides

to retire. He just does an outstanding job in everything he does."

Bethlenfalvy's rise to success started when he grew up around the game in Iowa. He credits his mother with getting him involved in playing sports.

"I grew up in a small town and we lived one block from the public tennis courts," Bethlenfalvy said. "I spent most of my time in the summer playing tennis. My mother encouraged me and supported me, and that made a big difference."

Although he did not have a tennis team at his high school, Bethlenfalvy found other ways to gain experience in the game.

"Our high school did not have a tennis team," Bethlenfalvy stated. "I spent most of my time playing junior tournaments in the Tri-State area of Iowa, Illinois and Missouri."

Bethlenfalvy took this experience to NCAA Division I Kent State University where he made the team as a walk-on.

"I was a walk-on and had a good first season," Bethlenfalvy said. "I was lucky enough to receive a scholarship the following year."

Bethlenfalvy made the most of his opportunities at Kent State. He was a captain of the team, the Most Valuable Player of the Golden Flashes and a Mid-American Conference champion before receiving his degree.

Bethlenfalvy was honored to receive the awards while at Kent.

"We had a close team that worked hard, so [the MVP] could have gone to anyone," he said. "It was a great feeling to win the MAC, especially since it was only the second time it happened [in school history]."

Bethlenfalvy appreciated the titles and was glad to have the opportunity to travel down south over the spring breaks.

"I loved playing tennis, traveling and spending time seeing other schools," Bethlenfalvy said. "I remember taking our spring trips to North and South Carolina. The competition was good and the traveling was fun."

Upon his 1968 graduation from Kent State University, Bethlenfalvy was a ranked doubles player in Northeast Ohio.

He also began his coaching career at local Parma Senior High School.

Since 1974, Bethlenfalvy has been a member of the United States Professional Tennis Association and the United States Tennis Association. In 1975, Bethlenfalvy graduated from the Tennis Institute in New York City.

Bethlenfalvy has served as a tennis pro at several area clubs. From 1974-77, he was the head tennis pro at the Big Creek Racket Club. Bethlenfalvy also served as the tennis pro from 1977-1999 at the River Run Racket Club in Strongsville. It was during that time that Bethlenfalvy became interested in Baldwin-Wallace.

"Over the years, I had some of the women who played tennis at B-W work with me on lessons and improving their game," said Bethlenfalvy, who recently received congratulations from another former B-W tennis alumnus, ESPN tennis analyst Arthur "Bud" Collins. "When the opportunity opened up and they were looking for a tennis coach, I made the jump from high school to college.

"This has been a great place to work and with so many good people," said Bethlenfalvy. "Our young women are just a joy to coach."

Since taking over the program at B-W, Bethlenfalvy has compiled his 200-152 record and is the winningest

women's tennis coach in school history. In 1992, his B-W squad finished with a 13-1 overall mark which is the best single-season mark in school history.

Bethlenfalvy, who led the team to a 1999 OAC title, was named the 1999 Ohio Athletic Conference Women's Tennis Coach of the Year.

quickly to appreciate his style of coaching.

"[Coach] knows exactly when to get down to business, but [he] also makes sure that our time in college on the team is fun," said first singles player and defending OAC Women's Tennis Player of the Year, Andrea Isaac of New Philadelphia. "Jack has helped me raise my production by not placing too much pressure on myself.

"I thrive with him as my coach [because of] his pure encouragement and excitement about playing," Isaac stated. "If I am having a problem in my game Jack helps me fix it and is incredibly patient." Bethlenfalvy loves winning titles, but is gratified by his relationships with the players.

"After all the time and practice, winning matches and the championship is rewarding," said Bethlenfalvy. "However, the most satisfaction comes from the interaction and rapport I have with my players.

"Each young woman who plays tennis at a school like Baldwin-Wallace does so because she loves the sport and enjoys playing tennis," said Bethlenfalvy. "They are here for the love of the game. It is such a rewarding experience having the opportunity to see each of them succeed not only on the tennis court but in life in general. I wouldn't trade that experience."

Bethlenfalvy believes the 2004-2005 Jackets have a great opportunity to win an OAC title this spring.

"We have a young, talented team so that goal [of an OAC championship] is within reach," he said. "We just need to continue to get better and improve each time we play. We are looking forward to the next four weeks of our season."

When Bethlenfalvy decides it is time to hang up the whistle, he wants people to remember his career and the way his players handled the game.

"I want people to remember that my players know how to handle winning and losing," he stated. "Winning is usually easy, but losing can be difficult.

"We are lucky we are able to run around on a tennis court and play game we love," Bethlenfalvy added. "I hope my players are able to look back with great memories of playing tennis at Baldwin-Wallace."

You can bet that many people will remember Coach Jack Bethlenfalvy and all that he achieved too.

BEREA, OHIO — Nineteen year Head Coach Jack Bethlenfalvy, a recent winner of his 200th career match when the Baldwin-Wallace College women's tennis team defeated Cleveland cross-town rival Case Western Reserve University, 8-1, on April 4, has seen his program undergo a youth movement in the past three years.

One of Bethlenfalvy's solid youngsters is freshman fifth singles and second doubles player Krista Marshall, a graduate of Medina Senior High School.

"Krista is part of a very young team that is very talented," said Bethlenfalvy. "When we entered the year, my thought was that we would be good this year, but a year away from really contending for the Ohio Athletic Conference title because we were so very young. But our freshman, including Krista have gotten better and better and now we feel that we have a great shot to win it this year."

Marshall is part of a Yellow Jacket lineup that does not include a senior.

Sophomore Andrea Isaac, the 2004 OAC Player of the Year, is at number one singles and freshman Megan Glassburn plays second singles and teams with Isaac as the first doubles team. Freshman Tiffany Allison plays No.3 and juniors Ashley Sanders and Kristen Thomson alternate at No.4. Marshall is at No.5 and junior Lizz Moore plays No.6.

This group of youngsters are not playing like youngsters as they currently own a 12-3 overall and perfect 3-0 OAC record.

"Our record is indicative of the way we have played," said Bethlenfalvy. "One of our wins is against Division II Ashland University. Again, the best part of this team is that there is not one senior and all of the women get along well together. We have great team chemistry."

Marshall, a 19-year old health promotions and education major, began her tennis career at an early age.

"I started when I was younger just for fun," said Marshall, who is 7-10 overall in singles play and 14-4 in doubles. "I kept playing all my life and started joining teams."

Marshall took this early beginning to Medina Senior High School of the Pioneer Conference.

While in high school, Marshall played junior varsity basketball for a season. During the springtime, she played four years of tennis and garnered four letters.

Along with the team honors, Marshall earned several accolades.

During her four-year career, she was a four-time All-Pioneer Conference first-team selection and a three-year All-Medina County Gazette pick.. Marshall was also chosen to the Pioneer Conference All-Academic team and was given the Medina Booster Club Unsung Hero Award.

It was during her senior year at Medina where Marshall set a school record with a 17-8 mark. She went undefeated in the Pioneer Conference.

"Krista also is a good student, both in the classroom and on the tennis court," said Bethlenfalvy. "She always wants to learn, to improve to become better. That is the type of student and player we want at Baldwin-Wallace College. We are very happy to have her in our program."

Before choosing a college, Marshall looked at several colleges, including other OAC schools. However, when it came time to make a decision, she chose B-W.

"The tennis program here [at B-W] is good," said Marshall. "I came up to one of the matches [last spring] and the girls were really supportive of each other. That is the type of team I like to be a part of."

"I am glad I made this decision [to come to B-W]," Marshall added.

When she got to college, Marshall noticed some differences between the high school and collegiate levels.

"The people are all good at the college level," she said. "They all really want to play. It makes you a better player too because you can't take any opponent for granted."

Marshall feels that Coach Bethlenfalvy and her new teammates helped make the adjustment from high school to college less stressful.

"The coach and the girls on the team made it easy," said Marshall. "I came to practice and they wanted to get to know me and were really supportive. It has really become a comfortable situation and has made it better for me both in the classroom and on the court."

said Isaac, the school record-holder for wins in a season by a freshman with 19 (a 19-1 slate en route to player-of-the-year accolades). # Baldwin-Wallace College Sophomore and Reigning OAC Women's Tennis Player of the Year Andrea Isaac Looks to Tie and Break Mark

BEREA, OHIO —Young athletes are usually viewed as the future of the program. For the Baldwin-Wallace College women's tennis team and sophomore first singles player Andrea Isaac the future is now.

Isaac, a resident of New Philadelphia and a graduate of New Philadelphia High School, is the Yellow Jackets' first singles player and the reigning Ohio Athletic Conference Player of the Year. A year ago, Isaac became the first B-W women's tennis player and the first freshman in OAC history to win that honor.

Winning 19 matches as a freshman and winning player-of-the-year accolades did not surprise Yellow jacket 19-year veteran Head Coach Jack Bethlenfalvy.

"She has tremendous power and a strong forehand that she hits winners with from the baseline," said Bethlenfalvy, who recently (April 4) won his 100th career match. "She has great control of her strokes which allows her to exploit her opponents' weaknesses while taking advantage of her strengths."

The only question was how well Isaac and her team would play as a sophomore. Isaac has easily put to rest the old adage of a sophomore slump by compiling a 19-5 record at No.1 singles and leading the team to a 15-4 overall and perfect 5-0 OAC record entering its match tomorrow (Saturday, April 16) at Muskingum College.

The 19 wins this season matches

Isaac's total of a year ago when she finished 19-1 overall. It also is one win shy of tying Theresa Olenick's B-W school-record of 20 wins which was set in 1997. In addition, the 15 wins by the team this season has already tied the school single-season record of 15 set in 1999 when it was 15-2 overall and won the OAC title.

"Andrea is our leader and our players watch her and learn from her," said Bethlenfalvy, who enters the Muskingum match with a 204-153 overall. "We have a very young and talented team and Andrea is a key to our success. No doubt about it."

Isaac began playing tennis at a young age.

"I started playing tennis as early as I could hold up a racquet," Isaac said. "My parents owned a tennis club and my dad was the tennis pro. He made sure I was always playing and being active and involved."

Isaac took this early start to the game to New Philadelphia High School of the East Central Ohio League.

While in the Red & Black of the Quakers, Isaac was a four-year letter winner. In addition to those honors, Isaac led the team to four straight ECOL championships. She also qualified for the Ohio High School Athletic Association District Tournament all four years she was in high school.

During her senior season, Isaac was a first-team All-East Central Ohio League selection. She was also named the ECOL Player-of-the-Year.

Along with those accomplishments,

Isaac holds the school record for career wins with 88. She had a .889 winning percentage during her time as a Quaker.

After all of these achievements, Isaac fell short of one of her goals, a trip to the State Tennis Tournament.

"The biggest obstacle I faced was to making it to states in high school," Isaac said. "I was so close every time, but

the Columbus schools were so tough to beat."

When deciding on a college, Isaac looked at Kent State and B-W. After looking at several factors, Isaac chose B-W.

"I looked at Kent State University to be in the school of music, but they did not have a tennis team," Isaac stated. "I chose B-W because I felt at home here."

"I loved the people the minute I stepped on the campus," Isaac added. "I am so glad I came to B-W."

Coach Bethlenfalvy is also happy Isaac chose B-W.

"I knew when I first talked to Andrea [Isaac] on her visit to Baldwin-Wallace that this was the kind of player I wanted on my team," Bethlenfalvy said. "She is dedicated, works hard, is team oriented and lifts everyone up with her."

When Isaac got to B-W, she noticed a large difference between her high school and college days.

"The easiest transition from high school to college was the independence," said Isaac. "I was so ready to be on my own."

"The most difficult part of the transition was that I missed my friends and family so much."

Isaac states that her mother, Jan, has been a big part of her success on the court.

"The biggest influence in my career has been my mother," said Isaac. "She has always supported me whether it be coming to the matches in 20 degree weather, bringing me a water bottle, or cheering."

When Isaac first put on the Brown & Gold of B-W, she felt "an extreme amount of pride."

During her first year at B-W, Isaac set a freshman record for wins with 19. In addition, her .950 winning percentage also was a single-season school-record.

"I had no idea until after my match that I broke the record for freshman wins in a season," Isaac said, who is 38-6 in her Yellow Jacket singles career. "I was excited and surprised."

I feel incredibly honored that I was named OAC Player-of-the-Year," Isaac said. "I never would have guessed that I would receive such an honor."

Coach Bethlenfalvy is glad that Isaac's play was recognized and appreciated by people outside of the program.

"I am very happy for Andrea and proud that she was voted as the OAC Player-of-the-Year," Bethlenfalvy stated. "As a freshman, she defeated every team's best player."

"She certainly deserved the honor," Bethlenfalvy added. "After all her accomplishments, Andrea is still as humble as the first day I met her in the Admissions Office."

In addition to those 19 wins, Isaac registered a 16-6 mark in doubles. She was also given the OAC Women's Tennis Player-of-the-Week award on April 5, 2004. During that week, Isaac went 8-0 and garnering four wins in each singles and doubles action.

Isaac's doubles partner from last season, Sarah Juzwik '04, was impressed with her abilities on the court.

"She keeps her head in tense situations," Juzwik stated. "She is able to forget mistakes [instead of] dwelling on them."

"My main goal is to lead Baldwin-Wallace College to an OAC title," said

Isaac. "Our motivation at practice is to talk about OAC Championship r i n g s . Individually, I would like to break the record for most wins in a season and in a career."

C o a c h Bethlenfalvy feels that Isaac has a great chance at the record.

"If Andrea stays healthy, it will not be a question of if but when she will break the all-time record at B-W," Bethlenfalvy said. "She will be breaking the B-W record in the number one spot where she will be going up against every school's very best player, which will make the accomplishment even greater."

Isaac also hopes the team accomplishes many things.



Isaac has a 38-6 career singles record and is only in her second season of collegiate women's tennis. She set school records for wins in a season as a freshman with 19 in 2003-2004 and winning percentage (.950).

After Isaac is done rewriting the B-W tennis record books, she wants to be remembered for her love of the game.

"The pure enjoyment I feel when I am playing is what motivates me to play," said Isaac. "I love tennis and I also love my team."

The Baldwin-Wallace College Women's Tennis student-athlete is one of the best publicized in all of small college and NCAA Division III athletics. Several factors help this to happen.

Its location, its national and conference affiliation and philosophy of athletics, its administration and coaches and its support of the student-athlete all play large roles in telling others about B-W and the successes of its student-athletes.

Baldwin-Wallace College is a small, private, liberal arts college located 12 miles southwest of Cleveland, Ohio. While being in the small and progres-sive local community of Berea, B-W student-ath-letes benefit from being close to a major urban area such as Greater Cleveland/Akron. B-W athletics receive support both in Cleveland and Akron and in the Berea community itself.

Being a member of the prestigious Ohio Athletic Conference and playing NCAA Division III athletics also is an advantage. Coaches who are teachers first forge a solid commitment to the Division III philosophy of the student-athlete. Baldwin-Wallace also is proud of its athletic heritage and the fact that it has produced the third most small college CoSIDA-GTE College Division Academic All-Americans since 1984. In 1997, B-W had three Academic All-Americans, including men's basketball player Kevin Braaten (Strongsville, Ohio) '97. The year prior, men's basketball player Brian Higley '96 (Stow, Ohio) was tabbed as a first-team Academic All-American. Overall, the Yellow Jacket men's program has produced four Academic All-American student-athletes since head coach Steve Bankson took over the program.

Support in terms of facilities, equipment and transportation and in staff provides the Baldwin-Wallace student-athlete with a luxury not enjoyed at many other schools.

One part of that support is in the area of sports information. A diligent staff of B-W sport information student assistants and sport management majors work with the director to publicize B-W and its coaches and student-athletes in 20 NCAA Division III sports.

The students learn first-hand about publicizing a program by updating the internet website, writing hometown press releases and doing feature stories, doing game and cumulative

statistics as well as statistical analysis, game and special event programs, recruiting brochures and media guides, contacting local, state and national media sources prior to and after each game and promoting and administering special events during athletic contests.

Each Yellow Jacket Women's Tennis student-athlete receives a preseason, mid-season and postseason hometown press release which is sent to the individual student-athlete hometown newspaper. When the student-athletes fill out a preseason questionnaire, each is asked to list his or her hometown newspaper.

After each women's tennis match, the internet website is updated, a FAX is sent to B-W's base of local, state and national media that regularly cover or have requested B-W coverage. In addition, hometown facsimile messages about individual performances are also sent either the night of the contest or the next day.

The day following an athletic event, statistics are updated and made available to all requesting the information.

Campus radio station WBWC, 88.3 FM, broadcasts all home and away football and basketball games as well as covering all other Yellow Jacket sporting events, press conferences or announcements on a selected basis. ***All Yellow Jacket men's and women's basketball games are also broadcast over the internet website at [www.bw.edu/athletics](http://www.bw.edu/athletics).*** A number of former B-W student broadcasters have gone to successful careers in the Greater Cleveland area, both in radio and in television. In addition, the four local commercial television stations and numerous radio stations do game coverage and feature interviews on a selected basis.

The Baldwin-Wallace College student-athlete receives excellent local small college coverage both in terms of game coverage and hometown coverage by *The Plain Dealer* (Cleveland's major daily with a circulation of more than 500,000 homes), the *Chronicle-Telegram* (based in Elyria, Ohio), the *Morning Journal* (based in Lorain, Ohio), the *Beacon-Journal* (based in Akron, Ohio), the *Medina County Gazette* (based in Medina, Ohio), the *Sun News-papers* (Cleveland's largest weekly newspaper serving the Greater Cleveland area) and a number of other daily and weekly publications in Northeast Ohio.

Overall, the sports information office at Baldwin-Wallace College offers the student-athlete the opportunity to receive maximum exposure at the small college level. In addition to giving the Yellow Jacket student-athlete the most comprehensive coverage available at the NCAA Division III level, the B-W sports information student assistant garners solid skills in writing, communications, marketing, promotion and publication layout and design. Overall, 14 former SID student assistants have gone on to sports information careers at either the NCAA Division I and I-AA level such as the University of Texas, Arizona State University, the University of Nebraska, the University of Arkansas, the University of Florida, Monmouth (N.J.), Kent State University, Eastern Michigan University and others. Others are involved with professional teams such as the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL and the Cleveland Force of the MISL.

## Applying to Baldwin-Wallace



Admission to B-W is offered on a selective basis. Each application is reviewed independently on its own merits, with careful consideration of course work, class rank, grade point averages, recommendations, test results (SAT or ACT) and extracurricular activities. To apply for admission, we encourage you to complete the application between **September** and **March** of your senior year.

A good high school preparation for B-W includes four years of English, and at least three years of math, social science and natural science, two years of foreign language, and three years of additional academic electives.

Candidates are considered as soon as all application requirements have been met, with notification usually within four to six weeks after their credentials are received.

## An Exceptional Value

B-W is committed to making college affordable. In fact, your chances of receiving some form of financial assistance at B-W are excellent. Nearly two-thirds of our current students receive B-W need-based aid; and more than 90 percent receive assistance in some form.

Your first step in the financial aid process is to complete the F.A.F.S.A. (Free Application for Federal Student Aid). This should be completed no later than March 1st. After you have been admitted to B-W and the F.A.F.S.A. report has been received and processed, you will receive your award. Typically this will consist of gift assistance (need-based grant and scholarship), low interest federal loans and work study employment.
